There is no admission charge; non-member browsers will be allowed to order lunch or dinner at the club.

BOOKS - NEW and used, autographed, paperback, hard cover, fiction and non-fiction - will be sold at reasonable donations. Proceeds from the sale are for a scholarship that will be awarded to an outstanding woman student majoring in journalism.

The award is traditionally given at Theta Sigma Phi's annual Ladies of the Press Breakfast, slated for May 11 at Cobo Hall with Margaret Cousins, senior editor of Doubleday, as the guest speaker.

A SPECIAL fashion show, "How to Dress Like an Exciting Bookworm," will be presented at 6 p.m., with a special bookworm award to be presented for the first time.

Assisting co-chairmen Beverly Beltaire and Alice Curtis will be Theta Sigma Phi officers and members from the Birmingham area and Wayne State and the University of Michigan student chapter members.
