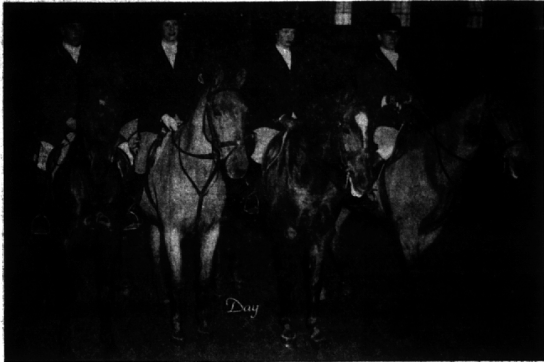


### BOH Riders Win Junior Olympic

### Peter Foley Cops Individual Honors

"The Untouchables"—a quartet of top young riders at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club came from behind Sunday to win the A Division championship in Junior Olympic competition.

Peter Foley, 16, of 1211 Willow Lane, Birmingham, a member of the championship team, was chosen individual champion in the A Division. He edged Donna Brown, 17, of 1781 Squirrel Road, by a mere four-tenths of a second in a jump-off.

The champions were chosen on the basis of points accumulated during five meets, the first of which was held in mid-December.

GOING INTO the final meet, the Wallace Topnotchers of Northville were leading The Untouchables by one point.

The Bloomfield group had a bad morning in which 11 faults were accumulated. Northville collected 17 in the afternoon and the two teams were tied.

The Untouchables won in a jump-off on a shortened course and where time was an important factor.

Grosse Pointe Foxhounds were champions in B Division and the Toledo Sparks were reserve champions. The Wallace Miglits took top honors in the Pro-Am Division and the Wallace Lassies were reserve champions.

OTHER MEMBERS of the championship team were Debbie Willson, Lucy Bates and Robert Lambert Jr.

"Untouchables" were coached by Egan, a sophomore at Brother Rice, is active in other sports, in-

cluding football, track, cross country and swimming.

Egan feels that Foley has the ability to make the U. S. Equestrian team when he finishes high school. He also mentioned Lambert as a top prospect from the hunt club.

THE YOUNGSTERS Sunday were competing with some of the best riders within a 100-mile radius of Birmingham.

All the Junior Olympic competition has taken place either at Bloomfield or Grosse Pointe, the only two clubs in the area with winter stabling facilities.

Bloomfield Open Hunt may compete in the Phoenix Hall Farms team competition in Toronto in August.

The riders and horses will start showing at Grosse Pointe on April 27 and 28. A P.H.A. event is scheduled at Bloomfield on Sunday, May 5.

### New Pony & Colt Program Boasts Experience, Depth

This is the third and final article in a series on organized baseball for youngsters 8 to 16 in the Birmingham area. It deals with the new Pony & Colt leagues. The two previous articles explained the Little League and Babe Ruth programs.

The Birmingham Pony & Colt Leagues offer to boys 13-16, what they like to call "step by step" baseball.

The birth of the organization here, according to officials, was precipitated by a need for a transition program between Little League and regulation baseball which would provide:

- An intermediate-sized diamond for 13 and 14-year-olds.
- Limitation to a two-year age span for competition.
- An opportunity for 16-year-olds who, heretofore, have had American Legion baseball as their only alternative. For the overwhelming majority, the Legion competition is prohibitive for a 16-year-old competing with 19-year-olds.

THE INITIAL impetus for the new program was provided by Ed Schreck, who now serves in a double capacity as treasurer of both leagues.

Schreck, who played three years of varsity baseball at Purdue and who has worked with Birmingham Little League, felt a need for a new program that would better serve the interests of youngsters here.

In August, 1962, he contacted 25 men whom he knew to be active in boys' baseball. The response was favorable, meetings were held, and on Feb. 18, 1963, Pony & Colt was incorporated.

"We feel we have the most experienced men available," says Schreck. "They have shown in the past what they can do. Nearly all of our officials have Little League experience."

OFFICERS and their previous records are Steve Gromek, commissioner of Pony & Colt, who was Continental Little League coach and a pitcher for the Detroit Tigers and Cleveland Indians; Bob Spitznagel, assistant commissioner, was president of Joint Little League Board, 1961; Schreck, treasurer, was a board member of Little League in 1962 and managed three years in Continental Little League. Bob Gleason, secretary, was vice

### Barons Bumped by Waterford

Bloomfield Hills drew a blank in the hurdles Monday and it was enough to thwart the Barons' bid for their first track victory of the 1963 season.

The win went to visiting Waterford Kettering who outscored the Hills squad, 60-49, on the basis of a strong showing (18-0) in the hurdles. The Barons outpointed Kettering in the field events, 21-15.

"When we lost Art Tregenna and Ted Barrett last year, there went our hurdles points," claimed coach Don Hoff. He will try to fill the gap by moving some of his younger sprinters up to the team.

A BRIGHT spot in the Baron lineup was Bud Calhoun, who placed first and set a new school record of 48' 8" in the shot put. His heave eclipsed a former 46' 7" set by Barry Wickstrom in 1959.

Roger Stewart took honors in the high jump with a leap of 5' 6" and Brian Bish captured a first in the pole vault at 10' 10".

Other winners for Bloomfield Hills were Bob Richards at 2:04 in the 880; Jack Armstrong, 52.9 in the quarter; and Tom Hoogengardner at 4:48 in the mile.

"Actually it was a real good meet considering it was the first one of the year," claimed Hoff. "Both schools recorded some good times."

TOM MULLINS of Waterford hurt the Barons with two firsts—in the 100 and the 220. His times were 10.3 and 22.5 seconds.

Hoff will take Richards, Stewart, Hoogengardner and Bish to the Mansfield (O.) Relays Saturday. The Barons next meet will be against Northville April 22 at home.

### Return to Cinders: Maples Bop Redford

In the first outdoor dual track meet of the season, Seaholm literally ran off and left Detroit Redford, scoring 77 points to 32 for the losers.

The Maples were paced by Jack Harvey, Dave Kennedy and Ray Johnson in the individual events and the team of Bob Drotlicher, Kim Bateman, John Kingscott and Johnson posted 1:53.5 in the 880 relay for the best time in the state.

HARVEY TOSSED the shot 57' 7 1/4" to take over second spot in the state rankings; Kennedy ran the 880 in 1:59.5 to rank first in Michigan; and Johnson did the 440 in 21.5 which is also the best time posted so far.

In all, the Maples won 10 first places, eight seconds and three thirds. Harvey's effort in the shot put was a new school record, bettering a mark of 54' 1 1/4" in 1962.

Other winners included Nick Boersma the high jump, 4' 4"; Boersma in the pole vault, 10' 6"; Ken Heft in the broad jump, 19' 8 1/4"; Howard Dubin, 100-yard dash, 10.6; Stan Cutler, 100-yard dash, 21.5; and Drotlicher in the 220, 23.1. Bill Schoen was second in the mile at 4:39.4.

Several Maples will compete in

the Mansfield (O.) Relays Friday and Saturday.

JIM OLSON, Bill Bachelor, Tom Brooks, James Dennis and Pat Richardson are having the four-mile relay Friday afternoon. Four will compete and the fifth will be an alternate.

In the distance medley relay on Saturday, Kennedy will run the 880, Drotlicher the 220, Johnson the 440 and Schoen the mile.

Drotlicher, Kingscott, Dan Edson and Johnson will compete in the 880 relay.

Harvey and Gage Cooper will share shot putting for the Maples in the Mansfield event.

Seaholm's next dual meet is against East Detroit in Birmingham April 23.

### Tryout Dates Listed for LL In Southfield

The first of three tryout sessions for Southfield Little League is scheduled Saturday at Southfield 10 School, Berg and 10 Mile roads. All boys who have registered and expect to take part in this year's program, except those boys who played on a major league team last season, must attend. All boys must attend two of the three tryouts.

Other tryouts are scheduled for April 20 and 27—also at Southfield 10.

FOR APRIL 13 and 27 tryouts, National League boys will report for a 9:30 a.m. to noon session and American League boys will have a session from 1:30 to 4 p.m. On April 20, American League boys will try out in the morning and National boys in the afternoon.

All eight and nine year olds must report to the tryout this Saturday to be screened for play in either the minors or T-Ball. Eight year olds are eligible for either T-Ball or minor league play while nine year olds can play in T-Ball, minor or major leagues.

The regular season schedule will get underway in May.
