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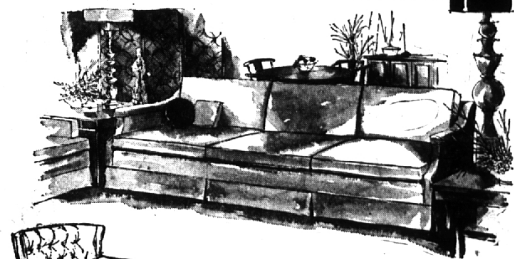
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Professor Says College Officials Need Training

Future college deans and presidents should receive formal training for their jobs, says John S. Brubacher, University of Michigan professor of higher education.

"The university which makes this extra effort may well be assuring itself of a very important margin of greatness," says Brubacher.

"Fortunately, the tools are at hand. The university with its faculty of public administration, the institute for social research, to say nothing of the center for the study of higher education, has shown itself alert to this avenue of development."

BRUBACHER NOTES that most college and university administrators were professors before they became deans, presidents and the like. "They were trained to do research, not administration."

"If they had any training in administration it came subsequently, one might say, through apprenticeship. They learned to administer by administering."

"A century ago, this was the way doctors learned medicine. They accompanied a recognized physician from bedside to bedside. Medicine would never have achieved its exalted position among the professions today if it had continued at this level of training."

"WHAT HAS MADE medicine great today is the fact that it has become a theoretical as well as a practical discipline. The doctor still learns from the ward and the clinic but he has a theory to guide him."

"College and university administration must do the same. It must develop a theory."

A GENERAL Contact Division of 1,000 volunteers will be responsible for the wide-spread contact in the area. It was explained that the campaign will be carried out on an individual contact basis, not a door-to-door canvass.
