Juniors Kim Kelo and Janis Adams are Bloomfield Hills High School's candidates for placement abroad through the American Field Service.

The process for their selection began this fall when 14 BHHS applicants were screened by a board consisting of BHHS' four foreign exchange students; students who have been abroad through foreign exchange programs; two Foreign Exchange Club members; Mrs. Irvin Sutherland, the club's sponsor and BHHS counselor; and a member of the Birmingham Lion's Club. Of these students, four were chosen as the high school's representatives. They were Kim, Janis, Eric Linder and Cindy Skalky. Their applications were sent to New York for further consideration and on March 2 Kim and Janis were notified of their acceptance.

THEY WILL BE placed in a Northern Hemisphere country if suitable homes are found for them. Both girls have applied for the summer program, which lasts eight weeks. Candidates leave New York in late June and attend concentrated language courses as they head for their new summer homes.

When asked about her reactions, Kim replied, "It hasn't really hit me yet." Said Janis, "I'm hoping we both get to go." The only thing that would prevent this would be the failure to find homes for both girls. As first choice, the girls would like to go to France or a French speaking country, since both are in their third year of French and enjoy the language very much. For someplace different, Janis would like to go to Sweden, while Kim is hoping for a visit to Japan. The candidates do not have a choice of countries.

The girls are now awaiting the end of May with bated breath, for that is when they will be notified what their summer destinations will be.

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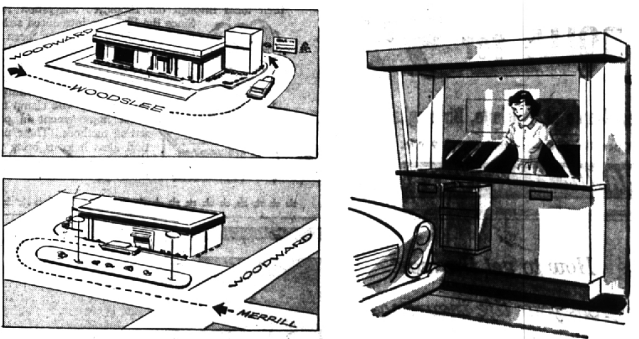
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
