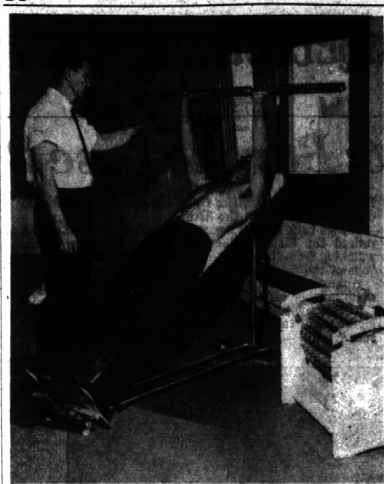

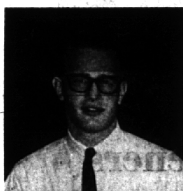

## Early Boat Registration Urged by Sec. of State

If you are one of the three out of five watercraft owners who have not re-registered your motorboat this year, you'd better act soon if you want to enjoy Michigan waters this May or June.

Since the current three-year registration period started on Jan. 1, the Department of State has registered 150,000 watercraft, or about 88 per cent of the estimated 400,000 or more motorboat owners in Michigan.

ACCORDING to Secretary of State James M. Hare, the unit which handles applications completes the process and gets the papers in the mail to the owner in about one week.

"If hot weather comes along and we are deluged with applications, it may slow up this present

smooth flowing schedule." Hare said. "For that reason, I'd like to urge all motorboat owners to get their applications in now. If they wait until Memorial Day, they'll catch us in the big crush."

The new registration, which costs \$3, is good for three years, from Jan. 1, 1963 to Dec. 31, 1965. To enable boat owners to retain the MC numbers they already carry on their watercraft, the department sent out pre-registered applications to all boat owners whose craft had previously been registered.

ALL PERSONS who received these prepared registration applications early this year were asked to return them at once with their fee so that they could retain their present boat numbers.

Hare suggested that motorboat owners check their application cards to see if the description of the watercraft, the boat registration number, and the owner's name is correct.

Where owners have changed addresses and have not notified the department, they will not receive the application forms. They, as well as those who buy boats not previously registered, can pick up application blanks in any Department of State branch office, in most sheriffs' offices, in many hunting and fishing license outlets, at marine supply shops, or by writing directly to the Department of State, Lansing, Michigan.

THE RECEIPTS go into the Watercraft Law Enforcement Fund and are used in grants to counties in setting up enforcement programs.

The state matches on a two-for-one basis, up to a maximum State contribution of \$20,000, the money appropriated by counties for watercraft policing and regulating programs.

"Just as the department collects car weight taxes for highway use," Hare said, "so it collects these watercraft taxes for the benefit of everybody using Michigan waters."

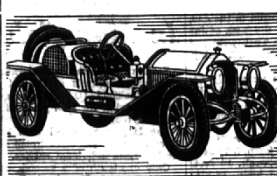
