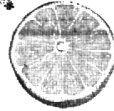

S'field Mayor Adds To Proposed Budget

SOUTHFIELD—An addition of \$13,728 has been added to City Administrator Donald V. Smith's proposed \$2.5 million budget by Mayor S. James Clarkson.

Among the recommendations made by the mayor was a difference in salary scales for city employees amounting to \$7,500. Smith had asked for a two per cent increase; Clarkson asked for a three per cent addition.

Other additions proposed by Clarkson were a \$1,628 raise in the assessor's salary which would then be \$10,000 and an extra \$1,000 for civil defense equipment. Clarkson also proposed a taken annual salary of \$500 for the city's civil defense director.

BOTH SMITH and the mayor proposed expenditures of \$200,000 more than the current budget. Both budgets are based on Southfield's property tax rate, limited by the charter to seven mills.

The mayor estimated that about \$20,000 would be provided by property taxes and the remainder of \$1.8 million from other state and city revenues.

Both agreed that proposed expenditures should be \$27,000 for library; \$82,430 for parks and recreation; \$511,950 for the water division; and \$398,473 for the highway division.

A public hearing will precede final approval. The City council has until May 11 to draw up the final budget.

budget is a request for a three per cent salary increase for all employees and provisions for salary adjustments. No personnel changes are planned, but part-time help will be hired during spring and summer months for road maintenance.

THE TOTAL bonded indebtedness—\$1,028,382—lies in four areas: special assessment street improvement, \$3,000; Evergreen interceptor capital cost, \$270,382; sanitary interceptor sewer project, \$250,000; and storm water drainage program, \$525,000.

The storm sewers, to be paid for in annual installments of \$30,000, will be completed this summer.

Lathrup City Council will hold a public hearing on the budget at 8 p.m. May 6 in the A.A.A. Office Building, 26026 Southfield Road.

Adoption of the budget is expected at the regular meeting of the council at 7:30 p.m. May 16. The meeting date was re-scheduled from a prior announced date of May 20.

public hearing on the proposed lot unless condemnation proceedings were started.

Under the proposed condemnation the City would declare the parking lot improvement a public one "within the scope of the City's power" and declare that it is necessary to take private property to make the improvement.

The city attorney would be authorized to institute and conduct any necessary proceedings on behalf of the City in Oakland County Circuit Court to carry out the objectives of the resolution and to acquire by condemnation the property.

STUDIES conducted by the city over the past two years have indicated a need for an increase in the number of off-street parking spaces available in the vicinity of the Baldwin Library, Community House and Birmingham Municipal Building. Commissioners have repeatedly assured residents of the central Birmingham area they were not "overlooking" any segment of the city in the planning of the city's future.

IF...

3. DEAD PATCHES in the lawn show little or no green grass shoots rake them out, add a pinch of seed, scratch in the seed, tamp it lightly, water and get on with your golf, or boat, or bridge, or both.
4. Maple tree leaves had reddish, purplish, ugly/leah swellings last year SPRAY THEM NOW with LIQUID LIME-SULPHUR—IF THE BLOSSOMS ARE OUT and the LEAF BUDS ARE NOT OUT.
5. NEEDLE TREES show brown near the top or at the ends of branches, water well and add RAPID GRO for a quick shot.
6. You have rhododendron, azalea or other broadleaved evergreens, BE SURE that the soil is quite ACID. If you bring us a sample of soil from 2" below the surface we will test it for pH (acidity). Bring a teacupful. (No charge for one test.)
7. It is impossible for you to come to the store (it is very exciting right now), call us for your needs, FREE DELIVERY every day in our area.
8. Your terrace or garden would be enhanced with a bird bath, fountain, statue, or "whatever we have" we have it on our PATIO or in the catalogues.
9. Flower and vegetable gardens have not yet been prepared—he sure to add the following before digging: a) DRICURE—If mild nourishment and humus is needed to improve the soil texture. b) SAND & PEAT MOSS if it is heavy with clay. c) 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 fertilizer at the rate of 4 lbs to 100 sq. ft. in all cases. d) And so on. Bring your questions to us.
10. Some of your ROSES died you may find a superior plant in our shop. They are actually potted plants, but you plant the pot along with the plant. Neat, eh?
11. You are confused about garden and lawn problems you may a) Choose the advice you think sounds best, or b) Come to us and get the proper advice.
