

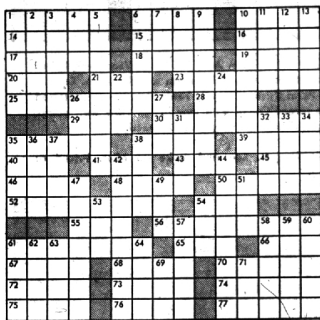

and to write, but she also has a soft spot in her heart for poetry. "Poetry seems to me a distillation of wisdom in an understandable, easily communicable form," she said.

"And what has she to say about the present 'literary world'?" "For one thing, if you wish to be successful, you have to have something to say on what's 'fashionable'—there's no use selling marbles in September," she said.

MRS. COOPER, however, "lost little love for 'the angry young men.'"

"They're criticizing Man for being foolish. He's not; he's an animal upright—look at him! They're like sophomores in college who've just suddenly discovered Mommy and Daddy aren't so perfect after all," she said.

"I don't like to read dismal books because I think of life and death as triumphs—and books

which expose people for the fraudulent, weak creatures that they are remind me of all the wrong things I've done and all the things I haven't done that I ought to have done."

AND WHAT does she think is the most important thing about writing?

"Quite seriously, doing it."

Greta found that the opposition could not defeat this contract regardless of the position of the cards or the distribution. This hand was won in the bidding.

Several North players arrived at a six diamond contract and when a club was opened they had to find the ace of spades. When the North hands made their contract they made 60 points less than Greta did.

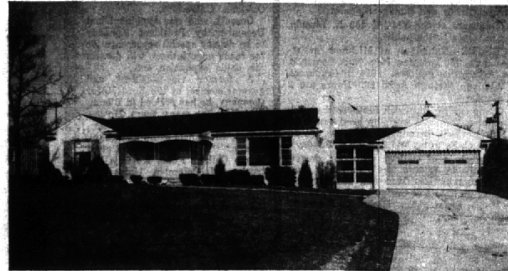

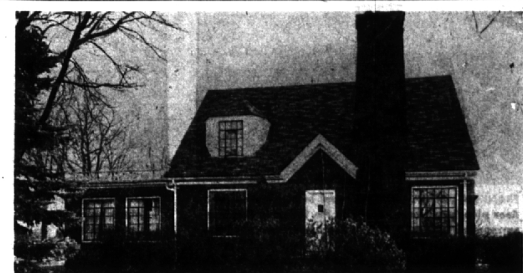
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
