The World Affairs Seminar, after more than two weeks of preparation, got underway last Thursday at Cranbrook and Kingswood.

Thursday and Friday, the days of the seminar, were very busy ones for the Cranbrook and Kingswood students involved. Discussions and lectures began at Cranbrook and Kingswood almost simultaneously at 8:30 and 8:45 Thursday morning.

AT KINGSWOOD, Mr. James Hamilton of the University of Michigan spoke and led a discussion 8:30 to 10 a.m. at Cranbrook, Dr. Sheldon Appleton of Oakland University led the first discussion.

Next at Kingswood was Mr. Juku Sitawata, from Indonesia, and Mr. Theodore Heaver of the U.S. Department of State followed Dr. Appleton at Cranbrook. After lunch, Mr. Kenneth Southwood from Malaysia and Mr. Tan Sin, Consul-General of the Republic of China, resumed the discussions at Kingswood and Cranbrook, respectively.

The day's discussions were ended by Mr. E. Fin Auer, Burma's delegate from the United Nations, and Mr. Puskar Johari, of the Embassy of India. There was a lecture that evening at Cranbrook. Hosted by Mr. Auer, titled "The Needs of the People of Southeast Asia."
