

Organizations File Constitution Costs With County Clerk

Total dollars spent for approval of the new state constitution were given in campaign expense vouchers filed at the Oakland County clerk's office by two organizations.

The League of Women Voters in filing, according to state law, also listed expenses of \$4,250.49. The Oakland County Non-Partisan Com-

mitted for the New Constitution spent \$2,227.71. The LWV report included sums from chapters throughout the state. Funds were raised by individual contributions and the regular operating budget, plus member dues and contributions.
