Statewide Ceremony Announced by Romney

Gov. George Romney has announced a statewide "ringing of the bells" on July 4th to commemorate our nation's founding and urged every citizen and organization to participate in this historic ceremony.

At the same time, Governor Romney announced that the HEY Clubs of the Michigan YMCA's would coordinate plans for the ceremony and that Grand Rapids high school senior David Dekker would serve as state chairman.

In a proclamation issued on the anniversary of Paul Harvey's famous ride, Gov. Romney urged all citizens and government bodies to ring the bells in their communities for four minutes at 11:30 a.m. of the holiday "as a solemn tribute to our country's founders and as a recognition of our national unity and underlying devotion to our country and for what it stands."

Gov. Romney pledged his wholehearted support of the nationwide program initiated by Connecticut men who were concerned that the Fourth had evolved more into a summer holiday than a patriotic festival.

"The sound of the bells will come as a thrilling reminder of what the Fourth of July stands for, challenging each of us to remember the heroic resolve formed by the men

who pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor 187 years ago," Gov. Romney said.

"One hundred and eighty-seven years ago on July 4, 56 freedom loving men penned democracy's greatest manifesto, The Declaration of Independence embodies our proven and great American principles and represents the bedrock foundation of our nation and our people. This was a divinely inspired document voicing what our nation's founders believed would be a new order of the ages," the governor's proclamation reads.

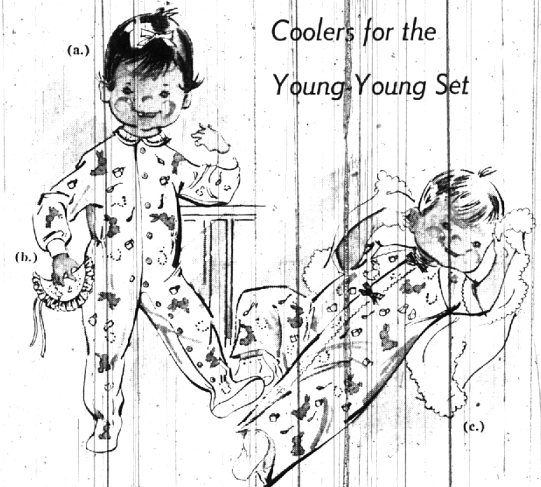
"ON JULY 4 each year, Michigan citizens pause with the rest of the country to pay tribute to the founding day of our nation and to reaffirm our deep and unswerving belief in our rich American heritage and principles. We must, however, do more than make this a day of rest and vacation."

Gov. Romney will send copies of the "Let Freedom Ring" proclamation to mayors and county clerks so that their cities and counties may take similar action and "so that building and school can ring with bells in every church, government building simultaneously on July 4th."

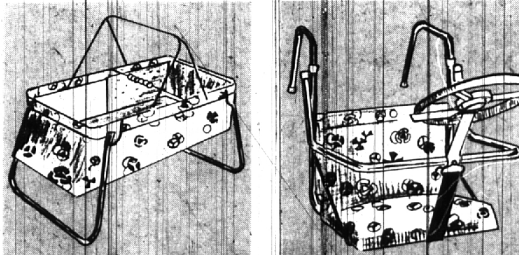

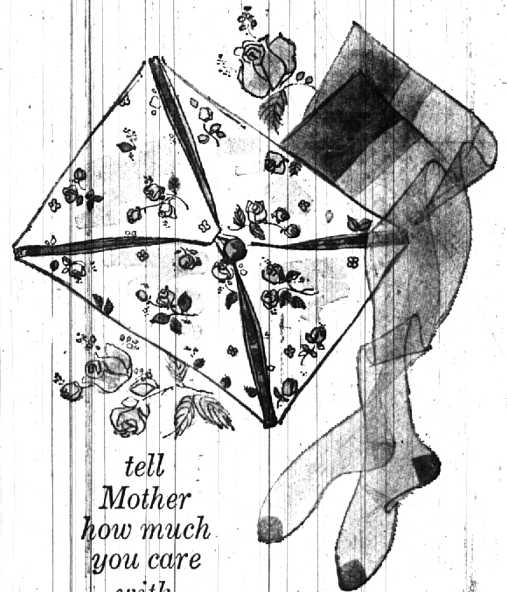

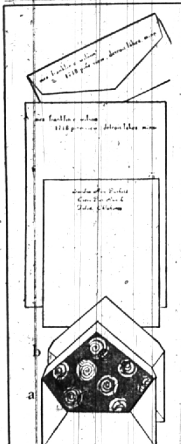
