

Perkins Doubles For Winning Run

In the seventh the Mustangs broke loose for three runs on four hits. Three straight hits, two singles and a double drove in two runs and another single later on in the inning drove in the third.

THE BARONS were unable to come up with a run in the bottom of the seventh, so the game went into extra innings.

Both teams went down in order.

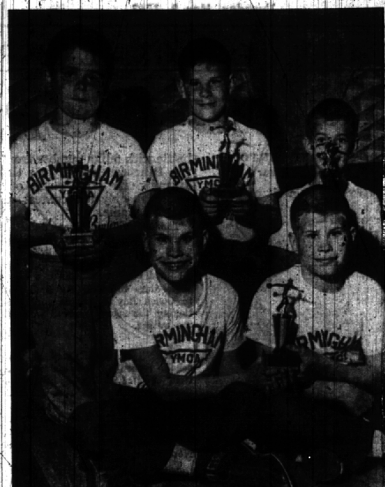
Dr. Albert Quanton was winner of the championship flight last year and Don Riegelman of the first flight.

However, Steve Leuchman of Thurston took first place in the event with a 51'10" put.
