

Four from Seaholm Are Merit Scholars

Seaholm students Hyla Clark, Pat Keough, Jerry Lohland and David Sanders are four of the 129 Merit Scholarship winners in the state of Michigan.

The eighth annual Merit program began in March, 1962 when 600,000 students took the test. This test, which is revised annually, covers five areas: English usage, social studies reading, natural social science reading, mathematics usage and word usage.

From these were chosen 11,000 semifinalists who were tested again. The number of semifinalists in each state is based on the number of graduating seniors. Each semifinalist is asked to

make another examination and file a record of extracurricular activities, special achievements, academic or other honors, etc. Semifinalists are also asked to file a financial information form which later determines the amount of the scholarship given the winner.

THE ACTUAL value of the scholarships have not been announced since the amount of the scholarship depends on the ability of the students family to pay for his education. The maximum amount is \$1,500 for each of four years in college. A minimum amount of \$100 for students not requiring financial assistance is also paid each of the four years. The average scholarship is \$845 a year.
