Wuggazers Leave Saturday For Holy Land and Europe

Saturday is the day the Rev. and Mrs. Theodore Wuggazer of Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, Birmingham, have been awaiting for nearly a year.

On June 10 last year members of the congregation gathered in Fellowship Hall following a morning service to present to their pastor and wife a two months vacation to the Holy Land and Europe.

This gift was given in appreciation for 32 years of service rendered by the family to Redeemer congregation and its members. On April 19, 1931, Pastor Wuggazer was installed as pastor of Redeemer Church.

PASTOR AND Mrs. Wuggazer will fly direct to Cairo, Egypt, Saturday, where they will spend two days of sight-seeing, including a visit to the great pyramids and Sphinx. There they are scheduled to take a camel ride and shop at the Monkey Bazaar before proceeding to Beirut, Lebanon.

From there they will have an eight-day tour by private automobile and guide through the Holy Land, visiting Damascus, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Nazareth, and the Sea of Galilee, retracing the steps of Christ.

Three days in ancient Athens will be followed by a seven-day cruise in the Mediterranean, with stops at the islands and cities once visited by Apostle Paul on his missionary journeys.

ROME, FLORENCE and Venice are next on the itinerary from June 4-9; and then on to Austria where they will be guests of Dr. and Mrs. Herbert Haas at their 375-year-old estate at Grundsee, nestled high in the Austrian Alps. The Haases, former members of Redeemer, will also host them at their home in Cologne a few weeks later.

For three weeks through Austria, Switzerland and Germany, the Wuggazers will enjoy travel by automobile furnished them through another member of Redeemer congregation.

Here they will have the company of their son and daughter-in-law who live in Frankfurt where he completes two years of military service. Their daughter, in-law teaches school in Hanau.

JUNE 29 to July 6 will find Rev. and Mrs. Wuggazer in Denmark where they will meet the Bishop of Denmark, Dr. Hans Fuglsang Damgaard. This audience has been arranged through another family within the congregation at Birmingham.

Rev. Zikas of Greece To Speak in Lathrup

The Rev. Philotheos Zikas of the Congregational Church of Alexandropolis, Greece, will be the guest speaker at Community Congregational Church of Lathrup Village Sunday at both the 9:30 and 11 a.m. services.

Zikas' church is one of the missionary projects fostered by the young people of the National Pilgrim Fellowship in which Community Church participates.

For the last three years this group has sent 16 of their members to Greece to help build a new youth center. This summer's project is to help clear the grounds for a new youth camp.

Zikas, who was translator in five languages for the armistice negotiations in Greece at the close of World War II, was born in Turkey and has been a refugee seven times since 1910.

PRESENTLY moderator of the Association of Churches in Northern Greece, Pastor Zikas has served as UNRRA director for Greece, an interpreter for numerous international conferences, and has personally been responsible for the founding of at least eight Protestant churches in Greece.

Author of many articles in national periodicals in Greek, English, Turkish and German, Pastor Zikas led the spiritual resistance to German occupation of Greece and was condemned to death on six different occasions.

The educational preparation of Pastor Zikas included two years at the University of Chicago.

Pastor and Mrs. Zikas are filling two month's speaking tour which will cover the United States from coast to coast, sponsored by the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches.
