State Bar Association Studies Lawyers' Status

The economic status of the lawyer in Michigan will be the subject of a state-wide survey of the legal profession to be undertaken by the State Bar of Michigan starting May 15.

It is estimated that more than three months will be required to gather, compile and analyze the results of the survey, which when completed will be presented to the annual meeting of the state bar in Detroit in September.

IN ANNOUNCING the survey, Maxwell F. Badgley of Jackson, president of the State Bar, said that "this is one of the most important contributions that could be made toward the welfare of the bar and individual attorneys."

"One of the prime reasons for conducting the survey," said Badgley, "is to point out to the bar and to the public the relative economic position of the members of the bar in our society. It is our belief that the better the economic situation of the individual attorney, the better the type of service he can render to the public."

"We feel that if the economic position of the bar is high that it will further attract outstanding individuals to the profession which in turn will be for the betterment of the general public and the services rendered to the public," he said.

BADGLEY STATED further that one of the hope-for results of the survey would be to provide attorneys with authoritative information on office operation, gained through the experience of others and thereby add to the efficiency of law offices and service to the public.

In direct charge of the survey will be the professional economics committee of the profession which Louis B. Tracey of Flint is chairman.

IN MID-MAY the 9,200 members of the State Bar will be sent a confidential questionnaire which has been worked out with the cooperation of the American Bar Association committee on economics and law practice and the American Bar Foundation. Members will be asked to complete the forms and return them in unsigned envelopes. The information will be computed by IBM data processing machines and done by an independent Chicago firm.
