Music to Fill Air at MSU This Summer

Michigan State University is fast becoming known as a major summer musical center. Music will fill the summer air again this year on the MSU campus as the university plays host to several outstanding workshops and programs devoted to a wide range of musical subject matter. The eight-week Congress of Strings from June 23 to Aug. 17 heads the list of activities. An array of nationally known conductors plus a qualified teaching faculty will instruct 100 talented string players from throughout the United States and Canada. They will play six public concerts.

THE STRING Teachers Conference of the American String Teachers Association will be at MSU July 14-15 in conjunction with the Congress of Strings.

The ninth Church Music Workshop will be held on campus July 7-11.

Michigan State's annual Fine Arts Festival is scheduled for July 15-20.

The eighth Piano Teachers Conference at MSU will be held July 22-27.

High school students who want to continue their musical studies with other students of similar interests will attend the Youth Music Program from July 28 to Aug. 17. The project is designed to help prepare the students for the coming year of high school musical activities.

The Stan Kenton Stage Band Camp will draw young people interested in popular and jazz music to the campus Aug. 4-10.

Korean Veterans Offered Dividends On Insurance

Approximately 7,100 Michigan Korean conflict veterans have about six months in which to take advantage of approximately \$74,000 in special insurance dividends to be paid to those exchanging "RS" insurance policies bearing the letter "W".

Robert W. Fitzgerald, the veteran's administration's regional manager for Michigan, said today that this special dividend offer expires Sept. 13, 1963.

It applies only to Korean veterans whose insurance policy numbers are preceded by the letters "RS". No other government life insurance policyholders are eligible.

TO GET HIS dividend, the "RS" policyholder must either—Exchange his "RS" term policy for a "W" term policy at generally, only one-third of the cost he is now paying. Although the term protection can be continued by converting to a low-cost, permanent plan insurance policy at any time while the term is in force.

Convert his "RS" policy to a low-cost "W" permanent plan insurance policy now.

IF THE "RS" policyholder takes either of these steps on or before Sept. 13, 1963, he will receive his special dividend. These dividends average about \$100, depending upon the age of the policyholder and the length of time he has held his policy.

He must act on or before that date, however, or the dividend cannot be paid.

About 480,000 Korean conflict policyholders throughout the United States have already changed "RS" policies to "W" policies. Approximately \$38 million has been distributed in dividends since the bill establishing this dividend became a law on Sept. 13, 1961.

Of every dollar donated to the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America, 75 cents goes directly into research of the neuromuscular disease.

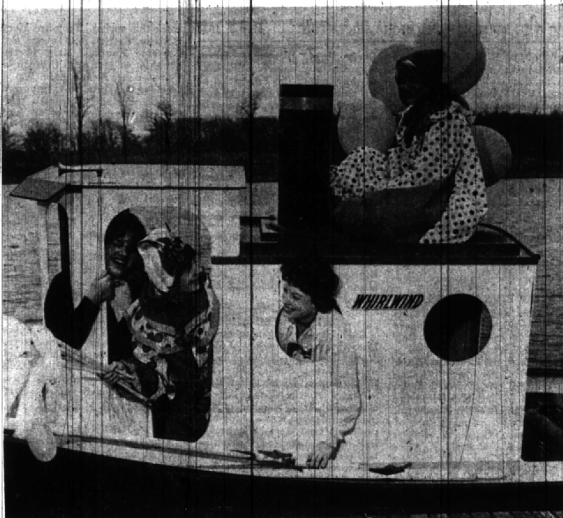
The extensive research program is carried on at the Institute for Muscle Disease in New York City. The Institute was built with funds provided by the MDA.
