Included is the new biography, "Lawrence of Arabia" by Alistair MacLean, one in the Landmark series.

Another, appropriate to the May 22 birthday of Richard Wagner, is "The Ring and the Fire," stories from the Nibelung operas by Clyde Robert Bulla, with woodcut illustrations by Clare and John Ross.

A MENAGERIE of animal characters is met in such stories as "Bristle Face" by Zachary Ball, "The Cat and Mrs. Gary" by Doris Gates, "Mistake" by Julia Cunningham, "The Summer of the Falcon" by Jean George, and "The Language of Animals," by Millicent Selman.

Winner of the Newberry Medal is Madeleine L'Engle for her book, "A Wrinkle in Time," a science fiction story. The Caldecott Medal has been given to Ezra Jack Keats for his picture book, "The Snowy Day." Both books, along with runners-up for each award, will be in the library.
