Woman's Role In Society Sets Theme for Conference

"What Is Woman's Place in This Perplexing Century?" The question is the title of a continuing education conference to be held at Oakland University May 22, from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.—and conference planners promise no answer to the question.

The conference is planned as an exploration—with psychologists, sociologists, homemakers, mothers, career women, part-time working women and university faculty members all participating in the program which is open to any women in the area.

The program opens with two psychologists, Dr. Elizabeth Drews of Michigan State University, and Dr. Frederick Wyatt of the University of Michigan, giving a woman's and a man's view of "What is a Woman Like?"

By mid-morning participants themselves will be into a discussion of the images of perfection of "What Should She Be?"; nest-holders, junior hostess, servant girl, goddess, cover girl, the loving mother, social service citizen, a culture Mary, a male equivalent, a blue-stocking or just "herself."

Following a luncheon women will be offered a choice of current panels for the homemaker; the homemaker looking toward a night performance for parents and friends are by invitation.

TEACHERS FOR all credit sessions are fully certified and during the past year Cranbrook has provided credit for college entrance as well as for high school. Mrs. Louise Cain, special assistant to the vice president for academic affairs, University of Michigan, will talk on other educational programs for women.

Dr. Ruth Useem of the Department of Sociology, Michigan State University, will give the afternoon lecture "Women Enroute from Farm to What Future?"

PANELISTS will include Mrs. Mildred Jeffrey, director, community relations, International Union, UAW; Dr. Audrey K. Wil-

son, dean-emerita of Women, Albion College and Dr. Ralph Green, psychiatrist and director, Haven Sanitarium.

Appropriately enough, the conference planning committee did not ask the University's Chancellor to welcome the women to the campus. They asked his wife: Mrs. Durward B. Vazner.
