Oakland Hills to Host World Open

Oakland Hills Country Club in Bloomfield Township, one of the world's top golf courses, will be the site of the first annual \$200,000 Carling World Open, Aug. 27-30, 1964, according to C. Norman Fry, club president.

Scene of four U.S. Opens, the most recent in 1961, Oakland Hills will provide one of the great tests of golf for the approximately 140 contestants from around the globe who are expected to compete for the first true golf championship of the world.

"We are extremely proud that Oakland Hills and Detroit were selected for the Carling World," Fry said. "I am sure that the entire community will join with us in making it a tremendous success and in providing genuine hospitality to the players, many of whom will be competing in the United States for the first time."

The Open will boast the largest total purse in golf with the winning pro receiving \$35,000. Second place is worth \$17,000; third, \$8,500; and fourth, \$7,200. Every contestant will receive a minimum of \$450.

OPEN TO amateur and professional golfers regardless of race, creed or color, the tournament will have at least 35 foreign contestants with the balance coming from the United States.

Contestants will qualify for the 72-hole medal play championship in eight world zones: United States; Canada; Latin America; Great Britain and Eire; Europe; North Africa, the Middle and Near East; Asia and the Far East; Australia and Africa.

The 1965 event will also be held in the United States. In 1966 the Carling World will be played in Great Britain, with the tournament moving to Canada in 1967 then returning to the U. S. in 1968 and 1969.

Co-operating in the event with the Carling organization during the first two years is PGA which has arranged the 1964 and 1965 tournament schedule in order that the open can be played the last week in August. The Aug. 27-30 dates follow the American Classic tournament in Akron, O. James Gagin, tournament di-

ret-acquainted session on May 4, opening day at the country club. Fry announced Monday that Oakland Hills will host the first annual \$200,000 World Open, scheduled for Aug. 27-30, 1964.

rougher Oakland Hills lay out faced the contestants in the 1951 National Open, with Ben Hogan's 287 winning by two strokes over Clayton Heafner. Hogan, after a faltering start of 76, followed by rounds of 71 and 70, finally brought the great course to its knees with a record-breaking 67 the only sub-par round in the tournament.

Two years ago, Gene Littler captured the 1961 event with a 69-70-71-72 to beat out Bob Gagliardi and Doug Sanders by one stroke.

CARLING HAS been a major supporter of tournament golf for many years, sponsoring the Carling Open, a regular PGA tour event; the Carling Cup International Matches, featuring a competition between the United States and Canada; and Carling

tournaments in Great Britain.

The original Oakland Hills course was built in 1918 and designed by Donald Ross, one of the pioneer golf course architects. Relatively few changes were made to the wind-swept layout until 1950 when noted golf architect Robert Trent Jones modernized the course in preparation for the 1951 U. S. Open.

Only minor changes were made to the 6907-yard, par-70 layout for the 1961 U. S. Open, notably reducing the total number of traps to 131 by removal of the few "put bunkers." Oakland Hills continued to live up to its reputation as one of the best courses in the world by only five sub-par rounds being scored, all 67's to the Hogan's 1961 18-hole record.

Littler's winning score of 281 established a new four-round total by breaking Hogan's mark by six strokes.

From Birmingham to Boston

A 50-mile hike? It would be kid stuff for Bill McMaster of Birmingham.

The 24-year-old Hillsdale College senior has definite ideas on what is a true test of endurance—such as a 50-mile run.

Small of stature (5-6) and a lightweight (130 pounds) the young man on April 19 joined a throng of the world's best distance runners in the Boston Marathon, and finished in the top 50 per cent.

McMASTER, who covered the 26-mile, 385-year blacktop course in three hours and 43 minutes, practiced prior to the race by running from Hillsdale to Jenewille and back during March and April.

"When I went to Boston," he explained, "I hoped to finish within the first 25 and nab one of the medals, but by the 22nd mile I had learned a lot and was praying that I could just finish."

The marathon was won by 32-year-old Aurele VanDenDriessche of Belgium.

Completely rested up from the grueling Boston race, McMaster already has plans for more running.

"If it doesn't interfere with my studies, I'd like to try the Marathon in New York next U. S. National Championship month. It's supposed to be a tougher course than Boston, but you don't have the foreign competition."

"If I don't run there, I'll be back in Boston next year," he added.

Although officially representing Hillsdale, McMaster was flown to Boston by the Air Force in a gesture of support from his reserve unit at Selfridge Air Force Base where he trains one week end per month.

Bill attended Catholic Central High School in Detroit where he was a miler on the track team for two years.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas McMaster, 31460 Bellevue Trail.
