Remedial courses in academic subjects will be offered

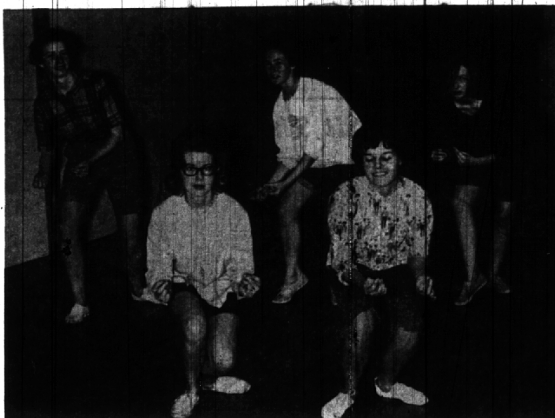
levels two through eight. Classes are also designed to prepare students for fall entrance in independent schools.

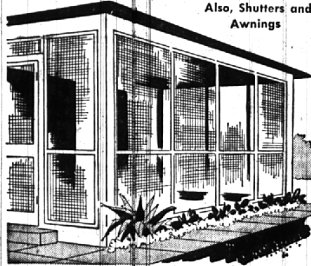
