Health Agency Gives Grant For Training

The United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare recently announced through its Public Health Service Agency the awarding of a training grant to the Oakland County Juvenile Court. The grant is for a three-year period and will be used to train doctoral degree students in the area of court-orientated psychological services.

Specifically, it will be for three 10-week summer periods during which students will be trained in the court and institutional settings. The grant will be in the amount of \$30,456. No additional county funds will be involved.

DR. ANDREW T. Yang, director of training services for the Juvenile Court, will supervise the training program with the cooperation of the court's psychological clinic. This unique approach to the training of psychologists to court services will provide experience in establishing training methods. Experience gained from the pilot project will be available to other courts upon completion of the program.

This Federal grant becomes effective July 1. Announcement of the availability of the training program has been made to graduate psychological departments of universities throughout the country.
