Famous Tell Favorites Of Scripture Passages

While recovering from an illness last summer, Birmingham Minister Dr. Homer J. Armstrong of the First Baptist Church wrote personal letters to 40 famous people, from G. V. Roosevelt to Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India, asking for their favorite Bible text.

Dr. Armstrong is using these Bible scriptures as the basis of his summer preaching. He began Sunday with the favorite Bible verse of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower:

“THE RAREST HEROISM”

Frank Laubach—1 John 3:17 “But if any one has the world's goods and see his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does the love of God abide in him?”

June 2: “ANGELS WITH AMNESIA” Detroit Mayor Jerome C. Awl, August—Matthew 16:26 “What will it profit a man, if he gains

President Kennedy—Romans 12:12 “Rejoice in your hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer” Also—Isaiah 41:17 and Isaiah 58:9

The Rev. John A. Root of the Birmingham Council of Churches has announced that it is impossible to complete the project in resettling Cuban refugees undertaken by the churches and the community.

Rev. Root, whose church is St. Andrew Lutheran, Birmingham, said he received this information in a letter from Church World Service's David L. Corbin of Immigration Services.

According to Corbin, the Miami Staff has attempted to interest Cubans in sponsorship opportunities in Birmingham, but no Cubans have expressed an interest in coming here.
