

# Cranbrook Wins Only In Baseball

Cranbrook teams faced not so well over the week end. Trying for its eighth straight Interstate League championship, the Crane track team took it on the thin, 79% to 59, from Western Reserve, who won the title.

The tennis team lost, 4-1, to Cleveland University School, ending the year with a final league record of 1-3. The doubles team of Steve O'Grady and Piero Getzinger won the only match for the Cranes, 6-2, 6-3.

HOWEVER, the baseball team made up, in part, for the other losses. The diamond won the league title by whipping Cleveland, 2-1. Dale Bosley batted in both runs—the first on a sacrifice fly in the second inning—and the other with a single in the sixth.

Dick Mosher, the winning hurler, struck out five, gave up five hits and walked one. The team's overall record this year is 11-4 and 4-0 in league play.

Jess Brewer of the Cranes was high point man in the track meet. He won the high hurdles in 15.4, the 100 in 19.7, was third in the 100-yard dash in 16.5, was third in the broad jump and ran the 880 relay team. He tallied 17 1/2 points.

A history major and a physical education minor, he has had considerable independent school experience in both teaching and coaching. Before coming to Country Day, Browne coached both varsity football and track at Hackley School, Tarrytown, N. Y.

BOTH MEN will carry on the newly established tradition of teacher-coach at CDCS which Dr. Snelling believes provides an intimate tie between the classroom and the athletic field.

"We have a tough schedule this year," Browne said. "But, with 12 lettermen returning, we'll be pretty well off. We need linemen. But, we have a decent backfield and there are a lot of good boys coming up from the junior varsity."

While Dillman readily admits that his boys will probably take their bumps, he says there is a nucleus for some "good competition" among the boys come next season.
