

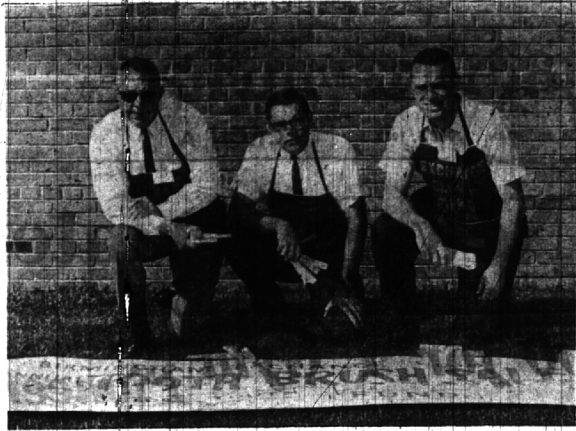
## Kilpatrick Sends Letter of Thanks To City Officials

## City Labor, Equipment OK'd for Arts Festival

The City gave its support to the 1963 Birmingham Arts Festival Monday night. Commissioners approved the use of City labor and equipment for several festival events and authorized the use of Shain Park as the site of many activities. "The Arts Festival is a plus factor we should continue to support," said Commissioner Carl M. Ingram. "I'm pleased to see part of it move back into the downtown area." Events for this year will be split between the Birmingham Art Center at Lincoln and Cranbrook roads and the downtown area.

THE CITY will provide for the festival committee permission to: (1) Use of parts or all of Shain Park on Thursday, June 6, through Wednesday, June 26. (2) Close Henrietta on the east side of Shain Park for the erection of the festival dome from June 6 to June 26. (3) Close Henrietta from Maple south to the alley for the installation of a festival court from June 13 to June 26. (4) Place 150 lanterns on the sidewalks in the streets used for flag poles and to erect posters announcing festival events. (5) Erect three tents in Shain Park that will contain art exhibits and demonstrations and to operate a cold drink concession in the park June 16 to 23. City Manager L. R. Gare estimated it would cost the City between \$1,000 and \$1,500 for its part in the Arts Festival.

COMMISSIONERS gave the festival committee permission to: (1) Use of parts or all of Shain Park on Thursday, June 6, through Wednesday, June 26. (2) Close Henrietta on the east side of Shain Park for the erection of the festival dome from June 6 to June 26. (3) Close Henrietta from Maple south to the alley for the installation of a festival court from June 13 to June 26. ## Oakland Group Home From Colombia Mission

Despite an anti-United States flag ripping incident in Cali, Colombia, which marred a good-will mission to that country from Oakland County, members of the mission, returning said that U. S. foreign aid to Colombia "is no away program of American money."

Spokesman for the group was Deion Hamlin, chairman of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors. "Hamlin was accompanied on the trip by Max T. Jarosevic, 4204 Butternut Drive, Birmingham, of the architectural firm of Tarapata and MacMahon; D. B. Varner, chancellor of Oakland County; George Galtin, 3226 Franklin, area development director for Detroit Edison, and George Krubb, director of the Oakland County Planning Commission.

THEIR TRIP was sponsored by the U. S. State Department to determine if Oakland County might be able to assist Cali in future development. Since it is a fast growing area, it is faced with many of the problems which Oakland County has had to solve, in recent years. The project was developed by Congressman William Broomfield, who has been critical of forging spending which produces no direct benefits to economically distressed people. The commission will make a complete report to Broomfield on their findings.

HAMLIN SAID it was too soon to say what specific assistance might be rendered. One need of the city is adequate and public utilities to serve the many people pouring from the countryside into the city, attracted by growing industry.

He thought Oakland County personnel might be of assistance in this field. The assistance the U. S. is giving Latin America, Hamlin said, was mainly in the form of providing technicians. Monetary needs are being provided 50 per cent by the Latin American countries and the remainder if for the most part borrowed from World Bank.

THE GROUP was not present when a pro-Gaullist, ripped down the American flag down over Cali's city hall in their honor. "We experienced no resentment against Americans," said Hamlin. Gov. Monzon of Cauca Valley

## Lathrup Aims S'field Road Zoning Law

LATHRUP—The only objection raised at a public hearing Monday night on the city's Southfield Road zoning ordinance was that it does not provide for buffer zones between commercial and residential properties.

DR. RICHARD KELSEY, 18101 Roseland, was the most outspoken resident on the subject. "You can't find a more disreputable hole than that first block on 12 Mile Road. The zoning ordinance

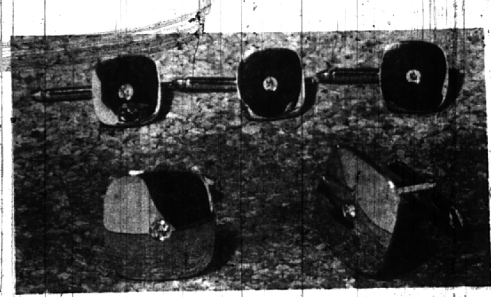
now doesn't call for any line of demarcation between the business places and residential property."

DR. KELSEY suggested that an "aesthetic-looking" fence on the residential side of the alley might be a solution. Councilman Vincent A. Zatliff countered this with the fact that "you can't force business to put a wall on someone else's property."

The area under discussion is on Southfield Road about a block south of 12 Mile. Mayor Richard Cogger said he couldn't see any solution to the problem right now, but we'll take it under consideration. City Attorney Everett Hayes told the council that he could no longer defend residential property along Southfield if the issue were taken to the courts.

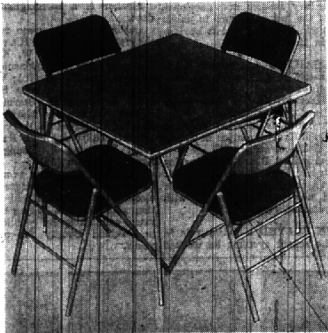
