Commencement exercises for the 20 graduates of the 1963 class at Detroit Country Day School will be held on campus at 10 a.m. next Wednesday.

The principal address will be given by James O. Wright, a former trustee of the school, now a member of the Advisory Board. His topic—"A Prescription for Success." Wright, 4160 Wing Lake Road, attended law school at the University of Chicago and George Washington University. He was associated with the Ford Motor Co. as vice president of the Ford car and truck group prior to his recent retirement.

COUNTRY DAY'S three-day program will begin on Sunday with the Baccalaureate Service at 3:30 p.m. The sermon will be given by the Rev. Charles H. Bunker, Minister of Christian Education, Kirkbride-Hills, whose topic will be "The Weakest Man in the World." Mr. Bunker will also give the prayers of invocation and benediction.

Robert Hayes, president of the Junior Class, will read the Scripture and the Graduation will be provided in part by the Yellow Jackets, a double quartet of singing students.

THE THIRD plan of the CBRA would involve the re-development of the block bounded by Maple, Southfield, Merrill and Chester.

The association would have the City acquire the Hill Building, playground and northwest corner of Maple and Southfield properties by exchange with the school board or by purchase.

A parking lot would then be built on the present Hill Building. Baldwin playground site. The CBRA proposed a semi-submerged lot constructed into the side of the hill.

THE CITY could then turn the roof of the lot into an expanded playground for the school. At night or on weekends the playground could be converted into additional parking.

Wilkening told the commission the lot would be able to accommodate between 475 and 500 cars. The total cost of the large project, Wilkening said, would be in the neighborhood of \$800,000.

During the meeting Wilkening allowed for 220 square feet per parking space in giving his estimates of how many autos the proposed lots would hold.

TUESDAY morning, he telephoned City Manager L. R. Gare and told him he had made a mistake and that 320 square feet per parking space should have been the figure used.

This would cut down considerably the number of cars that would be able to use the lot the CBRA proposes to build under the Hill Building property.

The commission took no action on any of the proposals presented by the CBRA.

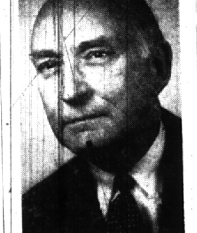

Headmaster Retiring at Cranbrook

At a general assembly of the faculty and student body Friday morning, Harry D. Hoey, headmaster of Cranbrook School for the past 13 years, announced his retirement "within two years."

Hoey has been at Cranbrook School since 1928, one year after the college preparatory school for boys opened. He is the school's fourth headmaster.

Earlier in the week Hoey announced his retirement to the

school's board of directors, and Chairman Martin S. Hayden appointed a committee to seek a successor.

THE HEADMASTER set his retirement at "not later than June, 1965, and preferably next June." Whereas the school has a policy of mandatory retirement at 65, Hoey will be 68 in August.

He gave as his reason: "After 35 years I sincerely feel the school needs a new voice and new leadership." He has no immediate plans for after his departure.

Hoey, who received his BA (1924) and MA (1926) degrees from the University of Michigan, had taught for one year at the University of Minnesota before coming to Cranbrook School as an English instructor.

BEFORE BECOMING assistant headmaster in 1944 and headmaster July 1, 1950, he served the school in various capacities.

Hoey and his wife, Nerissa, live in the headmaster's house on the school campus. They have two daughters, Mrs. Charles P. Whitlock (Patricia), of Cambridge, Mass., and Deborah, who will graduate this June from U. of M., and two grandchildren, Adam and Susan Whitlock.

Senior Swingout Assembly, at which seniors are honored and scholarships awarded, is being held at the high school today.

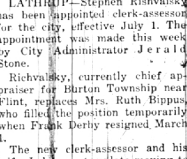

Commencement exercises for Marian High School are scheduled for 3 p.m. Sunday. One hundred and twenty girls will be graduated.

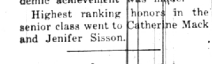
