## Surprise: Being Over 65 Does Have Advantages

NEW YORK—The 1,809 or so Birmingham residents who are 65 years of age or over are finding that there are some definite advantages in being that old.

They are also aware of some disadvantages. In fact, weighing one against the other, most of them would be quite willing to give up the advantages if they could lop off 15 or 20 of the years.

The advantages in point are financial ones. They are discussed in a publication released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Specifically, they refer to the amount of money that the over-65 citizen saves, just because they are that old, in the way of Federal income taxes.

ON THE basis of the off-

cial figures, reported for the nation as a whole, it appears that the 1,809 in that category in Birmingham saved themselves an estimated \$79,600 in such taxes in the past fiscal year.

The Government finds that, from them and from the others in their age group throughout the country, it collected almost 3 1/2% of a billion dollars less in the year than it would have received had they been under 65. The actual figure is \$742,000,000.

THE WAY it broke down nationally, according to the report, was \$482,040,000 saved by these taxpayers by virtue of the \$1,200 allowed them for personal exemption. The rest, the population, afflicted with youth, could deduct only \$600.

### BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE NO. 80

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 67 KNOWN AS THE ZONING ORDINANCE.

The Township of Bloomfield Ordains:

Section 1.01. This ordinance number 67 known as the Zoning Ordinance be and the same hereby is amended by amending the Zoning Map included therein and made a part thereof as follows:

That the following described property is changed from R-2 One Family residential District use to R-M Multiple Family District use:

A parcel of land located in the East 1/2 of the SW 1/4 of Section 16, located on West Long Lake Road, East of Telegraph Road, Bloomfield Township, beginning at a point, said point being the center of Section 16; thence N 88° 27' 30" W. along the E and W 1/4 line 806.96 feet; thence S. 01° 32' 30" W. 560 feet; thence S. 88° 27' 30" E. 123.33 feet; thence S. 0° 17' 30" W. 252.97 feet; thence S. 87° 08' 30" E. 450.98 feet; thence N. 5° 5' 46" E. 1128.91 feet to the point of beginning, excepting therefrom the E. 360 feet, said parcel containing 9.49 acres.

Section 2.01. The provisions of this ordinance are hereby given immediate effect pursuant to the provisions of Section 11 and Section 14 of Act 284 of the Public Acts of 1943 as amended.

Made and passed by the Township Board of Bloomfield Township, Oakland County, Michigan, on the 10th day of June, A. D. 1963.
