Water Safety Stressed in Grade Schools

During the last two weeks of school, members of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department and Trooper Lawrence Miller of the Pontiac Post, Michigan State Police, have been teaching Birmingham elementary school students fundamentals of water safety for the summer.

Known as "Operation Waterproof," the program, designed to stress water safety education to all the students, was organized by Seaholm physical education instructors Corey Van Fleet and Chuck Yearns.

THE LAW officers pointed out water safety tips to the children, encouraging them to enroll in a swimming program and teaching elementary forms of rescue that will not endanger their own lives. The students also were taught how to improvise life-saving aids for home swimming pools and fourth to sixth graders were instructed in mouth-to-mouth respiration.

A survey was made before the program and another is to be made after to see how much the children have retained.

Heading the instructors from the sheriff's department is Lt. Donald Kratt.
