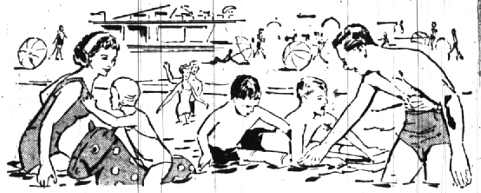
Sectional prizes went to Mrs.
