Ticket Sale Starts For Glamor Show

One of the most exciting and colorful events in Bloomfield Hills this season will be the Detroit Show and Hunt Fair to be held at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club from June 25 through June 29.

Mrs. Noel Buckner, Jr., ticket chairman, has announced that over 200 women in the two counties are undertaking a huge advance ticket sale. It is hoped that 5,000 tickets will be sold before the show opens. Proceeds from the ticket sale and the Hunt Fair will benefit the Oakland University scholarship fund.

The horse show is the largest outdoor show for hunters and jumpers in the country and will feature the nation's top riders in jumping and riding exhibitions.

THE HUNT FAIR sponsored for the second year by the Oakland University Scholarship Committee, will offer a colorful variety of activities for adults and children. A committee of 45 women, headed by Mrs. A. C. Girard and Mrs. L. L. Colbert,

has been working for the past eight months on the many unusual events of the Hunt Fair. The Oakland University Hunt Club Booth will offer a dazzling display of beautifully decorated sweaters. The Carnival of Games will feature amusement for children of all ages, from a miniature merry-go-round for the very small fry, to a shooting gallery for teenagers. Fifteen shops will display attractive merchandise in the huge tent housing the Hunt Fair shops and tea room.

Over 400 volunteers from Oakland and Macomb Counties will help at the Hunt Fair during its six-day run. The committee has proclaimed June 29 as Oakland University Day at the Fair. The University Men's Octet will sing at the afternoon and evening Horse Show intermission. Mrs. Alfred G. Wilson, honorary chairman of the Hunt Fair, will present the Oakland University trophy on Saturday night, and the University's Hunt Fair Queen will be crowned that evening.
