

## Proposal for Alley Calls for More Study

A hearing on the need for an alley in the block bounded by Pierce, Brown, Henrietta and Townsend was postponed for two weeks by Birmingham city commissioners Monday night.

Commissioners decided on the delay to allow more time for study between themselves and the plan board on the matter.

The plan board had recommended to the commission the construction of an east-west alley running from Pierce to Henrietta.

## City to Hold Access Drive Public Hearing

A public hearing will be held July 8 to approve the assessment roll for the construction of an access drive on the west side of Woodward north of Smith.

The drive had been requested by the Becker Orthopedic Appliances Co., to provide parking in front of its new building at 1776 S. Woodward.

William T. Killen, Birmingham city engineer, said the drive, which will provide six parking spaces, will cost \$2,600. The property owners are to be assessed 100 percent for the cost of the project.

It was first thought by the engineering department, that the Michigan State Highway Department would participate in a small share of the cost. The highway department ruled that since only one property owner would benefit from the drive it would not share in the cost.

The drive will consist of a 26-foot concrete pavement separated from Woodward by a three-and-a-half-foot wide divider strip.

## Three Youths Sentenced for Window Spree

Three youths who went on a window-smashing spree last Dec. 10 in the Birmingham area were given 10 days in the Oakland County Jail Monday by Circuit Judge Arthur E. Moore.

The trio, David A. Staudt, 20, of 5389 Kellen Lane, Bloomfield Township; Walter H. Riley, 19, of 573 Westchester Way, Birmingham; and Robert K. Ross, 19, of 599 Merritt Lane, Birmingham, admitted to Birmingham police they tossed bricks through windows of houses, store buildings and autos in Birmingham and Bloomfield Township.

IN ADDITION to the jail sentence Judge Moore placed the boys on three years probation, ordered each to pay \$440 restitution and \$150 court costs.

The boys had pleaded guilty to a charge of malicious injury to buildings March 28.

## Realtors Launch Program About Home Ownership

A communications program to acquaint the public with the basic investment values inherent in home ownership and the many contributions to community improvement made by realtors has been launched jointly by the top real estate organizations serving the western portions of Wayne and Oakland counties.

The program was announced by Richard H. Pank, president of both the Western Wayne County Board of Realtors and the Western Oakland County Board of Realtors. Both organizations are affiliated with the Michigan Real Estate Association and the National Association of Real Estate Boards.

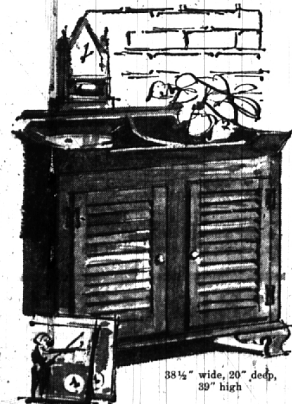
