THE BRIDE wore a classic gown of white coronation taffeta combined with Alencon lace, and she carried a bouquet of Amazon lilies and stephanotis.

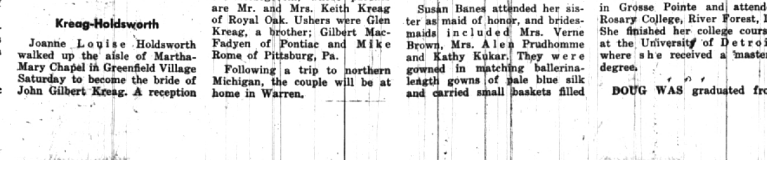
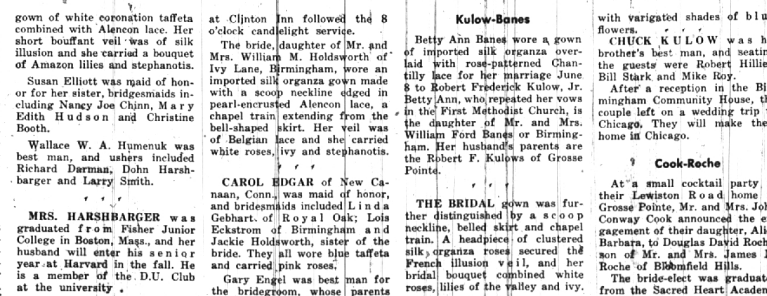
