Scholarship Goes to Area Golf Caddie

Melville C. Stewart II has been awarded a Chick Evans college scholarship by the Golf Association of Michigan.

Stewart, 18, son of Mrs. Melville C. Stewart, 16176 Marguerite, Beverly Hills, was graduated from Groves High School and will enroll in September at the University of Michigan.

The scholarship award was announced by George H. Webb of Detroit, chairman of the caddie scholarship committee of the Golf Association of Michigan.

He revealed that they were among 27 winners in the state of Michigan, chosen from among 101 candidates, a record total. The GAM has awarded 310 such scholarships since 1948.

IN THAT YEAR, it affiliated with the national program originated in 1930 by Chick Evans, famed amateur golf star, and under which approximately 1,500 scholarships have been awarded.

The scholarship to Stewart covers tuition and housing and is renewable for four years. The value is in excess of \$2,500.

His selection was made possible by financial support given to the Evans program by 45,000 golfers, including 10,000 in Michigan and members of the clubs at which the boys caddied.
