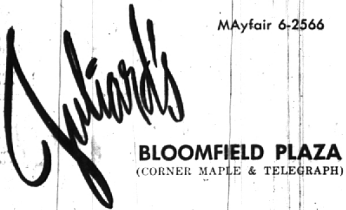
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Commissioners Approve New Zoning Change

One zoning change was approved and another postponed by Birmingham city commissioners Monday night.

The commission approved a planing board recommendation for the rezoning of lot 15 in the Birmingham Forest Hills subdivision from multiple-family (R-5) to single-family (R-1) and the westerly 80 feet of lot 16 from public property to multiple-family (R-4).

A change in zoning classification on the two pieces of property was required to allow the city to enter into a land trade agreement with A. L. Kassabian.

COMMISSIONERS delayed ruling on the rezoning of three lots along the alley that runs from Lincoln to 14 Mile on Woodward.

The plan board had recommended lots 1024, 1025 and 1040 be rezoned from residential to parking. Several property owners from the area Monday night protested the proposed change. They felt the parking classification on land abutting their property would lower property values.

The commission took no action on the proposal, because any zoning change that is protested by abutting property owners must have the approval of six-sevenths of the commission. Only four commissioners were present Monday night. The hearing will be continued July 8.

Grad Student Receives Fellowship in Senate

Richard N. Malow, son of Mrs. and Mrs. Nelson Malow, 19229 Riverside Drive, Birmingham, has been awarded an 11-month graduate fellowship in the Michigan State Senate, sponsored by the Senate and the Ford Foundation.

A Wayne State University graduate student, he is one of four Michigan students selected by the Senate Business Committee headed by Sen. John W. Fitzgerald (Republican, Grand Lodge).

Malow, a 1960 University of Michigan graduate, received his master's degree in political science this month from Wayne.

HE WILL BEGIN his duties as a Senate Fellow July 1, providing staff assistance for Senate committees by assignment of the Business Committee.

The program will last for 11 months and will apply 12 hours credit to his doctorate.

He will receive a monthly stipend of \$400, half paid by legislative appropriation and half by a Ford Foundation grant.

During his employment in the Senate, Malow will be enrolled at WSU on a half-time basis, participating on a weekly seminar under the direction of the Academic Committee of members of the political science departments of Wayne State, Michigan State University and the University of Michigan.

The fellowships are provided by a grant of \$21,000 from the Senate and the Ford Foundation.

Nestor Resigns As Assistant City Engineer

Birmingham assistant city engineer Andrew Nestor has announced his resignation from the position, effective July 5.

Nestor is leaving Birmingham to become county highway engineer and assistant engineer-manager for the Luce County Road Commission. Luce County is located in the Upper Peninsula.

City Engineer William T. Killen has recommended that Gerald L. Miley, present senior civil engineer, be given the position of assistant engineer.

Miley first came to Birmingham as a civil engineer in September of 1956. Later that same year he went into the Army where he served in an engineer company for two years. He returned to Birmingham in 1959.

Killen said Miley has worked in all phases of engineering and feels he is well qualified for the job.

Nestor, who came to Birmingham from Flint, began working for the City in 1960.

Children's Agency Needs Volunteer In Sign Language

A mature woman volunteer who is skilled in sign language and lip reading is urgently needed to assist the caseworker of an Oakland County children's agency in communicating with a young woman who is a deaf mute.

The assignment would consist of meeting with the caseworker and client once a week on Mondays from 12 noon to 1 p.m. for the next six to eight weeks.

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Teen Charged With Looting Telephone Booth

An 18-year-old boy will be arraigned Monday in Oakland County Circuit Court on a charge of looting from a building.

The youth, Dominick Ricci, of 2475 Franklin Road, Bloomfield Hills, was arrested last week by Bloomfield Township Detective Lt. James Keller for allegedly prying open a phone in a phone booth outside the Miracle Mile Shopping Center near Pontiac on May 28. If convicted, he could receive a maximum of four year imprisonment.

HE WAS BOUND over to circuit court at an examination before Judge Etnyre Higgins in the W. Bloomfield Township Hall Tuesday afternoon. Bond was set at \$1,000.

Police said Ricci was seen in the vicinity of the shopping center about the time the crime and tools were found in his car which could have been used. They, together with material from the phone booth, were sent to a state crime lab in Lansing, which ascertained that the tools were the ones used.

Smoking

RICHARD McINTYRE, Groves High School student council president, said parents should assert their authority at home while children are young and tell them that they shouldn't smoke.

"Smoking can't be controlled except during a child's younger years. After they start, not much can be done," he said.

McIntyre expressed his opinion that the penalty in the Birmingham high schools is not severe enough to suppress chronic violators.

The school policy has not had any effect on home smoking, he said. "Parents are not aware of a lot of things," he said. "Smoking is one of these things."

BILL CALHOUN, president of the Bloomfield Hills high school student council, said suppression of smoking is one way to teach a child respect for rules, both at home and school.

"Respect must be taught for other's property and rules," he declared.

If children are taught to respect rules, then school policies such as smoking restrictions will be more closely adhered to, he said.

"Society is accepting smoking at an earlier age," Calhoun said. But there must be a regard for those rules which are laid down, he added.

BLOOMFIELD HILLS Board of Education adopted the policy that a student caught smoking will be subject to a 20-day suspension from school for the first offense.

The second offense in the same school year calls for the violator's suspension from school for the remainder of the school year.

McIntyre and Calhoun both pointed out the difficulties involved in suppressing a child's smoking at home, because smoking is often indulged in without the parents' knowledge.

McIntyre cited examples of parents using bribery to keep children from smoking.

This often proved useless, he said, because children continued smoking—behind parents' backs instead of in the open.

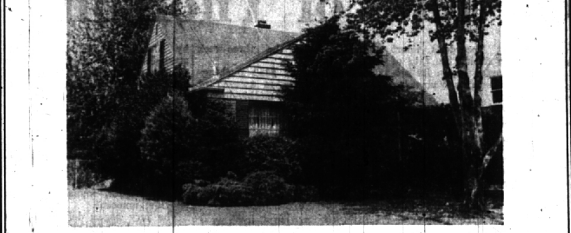
