

Pair Retires From Years In Teaching

Mr. and Mrs. Donald Murray, 388 Tilbury — Birmingham residents since 1937 — have retired from their careers in the public school systems of Detroit and Birmingham.

He retired Friday as principal of Northern High School, Detroit, after 39 years' experience in schools. Murray attended Olivet and the University of Michigan where he received his M.A.

He was coach, principal and superintendent in Mason, Mich.,

for 13 years. He came to Detroit as counselor at Redford High School for 15 years.

MURRAY HAD been at Northern for 11 years as assistant principal and then principal. Mrs. Murray retired this month after 15 years as a fourth grade teacher at Quanton School, Birmingham. For nine years previously she taught at Bloomfield Village.

The Murrays have a son, Dr. Charles Murray, a Birmingham

dentist, and a daughter, Mrs. Ted Greer, wife of a school principal in Minneapolis.

Log Center Developing In Northern Michigan

Manistee, Mason, Benzie and Wexford counties should develop into a "veener log center" within ten to fifteen years, growing some of the highest priced timber in North America, said Fred Johnson, veneer log buyer who scouts the continent for timber.

"The 'face' veneer he seeks is used in expensive furniture and paneling.

"Veneer logs must be the best—clear and straight. Hard maple and cherry are preferred species from northern Michigan, and second-growth stands can grow up to fifty per cent of timber volume on prime logs to be peeled," said Johnson.

"HARDWOOD thinning for pulpwood, as well as non-commercial subsidized thinning have been instrumental in developing this potential crop.

At a tree farm near Arcadia, Johnson measured a standing maple 21-inches in diameter that had two veneer logs worth \$35. "This is prime," he said. "From now on, this tree will probably grow more heartwood, less quality timber."

At a nearby hard maple second-growth stand he said. "This stand will double in diameter that will double in veneer volume within ten years." Biggest trees were about 16 inches, and the stand had recently been thinned for pulpwood.

This woods was unusual in that it had been thinned methodically

for a number of years, until tall, straight hard maple predominated.

"PROPERLY managed over, a ten-year period, timber volume can double. But on top of this, quality and size can up the grade so price per board foot can double, too," said Johnson.

Johnson's visit was a result of continuing efforts to help woods owners grow more and better timber crops under the company Tree Farm Family plan.

He said that the Tree Farm Family area should be producing substantial amounts of the high-priced "peeler" logs within fifteen years.

Water Accidents Take 60 Lives in State This Year

Sixty persons have been drowned and at least 12 others injured in 63 water accidents this year up until June 17 in Michigan, according to a State Police provincial report.

Twelve of the drownings resulted from falls from bridges, banks, docks or piers and through ice and include five children up through the age of nine.

In a somewhat comparable period last year (through June 13), there were 83 accidents in which 50 drowned and 34 were injured.

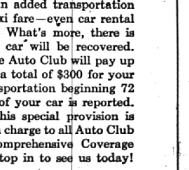
HONOR ROLL

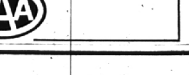
