No Report Cards Likely In Schoolroom of the Future

Windowless, ungraded, no report cards—this is the school of the future, say education authorities at the Michigan and National Education Associations.

They point to various experimental studies now underway on schoolbuilding design, teaching tools and changes in the curriculum. Here are some of them.

Windowless schools: Studies are underway in several places to determine whether schools without windows help students to concentrate.

Classrooms of different sizes: If the "team teaching" method becomes popular (the method in which a group of specialized teachers takes responsibility for a large class) school buildings will have to be changed.

Team teaching will require large rooms for use when the entire class gets together and small rooms for specialized small group instruction.

TELEVISION: An increasing number of schools are using it now as a teaching aid. This way a special teacher in, say, foreign language or science, can teach a number of children at one time.

Teaching machines: They may also find a greater use, depending on the outcome of continuing studies on their effectiveness and cost of the material they use to break down studies into such small steps that it becomes easy for a student to understand.

Films and slides: These already are being used extensively and intensively, as teachers find they save explanation and lecture time.

TAPE RECORDERS: Especially helpful in teaching foreign languages, recorders now being used in conjunction with slides and films to provide a running commentary for the ear to match the visual stimulus to the eye.

Subject matter: For several years, educators have recognized that the accumulation of knowledge is increasing so fast that teachers cannot teach all the facts that are known in a given area.

So subject matter teaching, in math, for example, is being taught so students understand the theory behind the facts. And along with this goes the idea that man can never stop learning.

TESTS: There will, undoubtedly, be fewer "outside" tests—those initiated by groups outside the local school system—which have already come under fire from school administrators. It is wasteful to give so many tests, the administrators say, because many of the tests measure the same thing—academic ability.

Grades: An articulate group of educators, whose number is growing, says that grouping pupils on the basis of age is illogical, because age alone has little to do with the level of ability of the student.

Grouping on the basis of grades in each subject is better—but the best is abolishing grades, and abolishing report cards, too. In-

stead, each pupil should be taught, these educators say, as much and as fast as he can absorb it.
