Preparations Are Complete
For Annual Southfield Fair

Preparations are completed for the annual Southfield Fair to be held July 2 from 5 p.m. to midnight, July 3 from noon to midnight and July 4 from 10 a.m. to midnight.

This year's fair is being sponsored by the Southfield Optimists, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Upper Teens, Inc., Lions Club, Kiwanis Club, American Legion, Business and Professional Women's Club, Optimists and Lathrup Parent Youth Association. All proceeds will be used to benefit community activities in Southfield.

INCLUDED in the events will be an art exhibit with an "on the spot" artist doing sketches. A band concert will be presented by the Franklin Village band at 8 p.m. on July 2. The League of Women Voters will have a voting booth for demonstration. The Southfield Civil Air Patrol Squadron will show a two-way radio station. The U.S. Army will show a full scale polaris missile and a nuclear polaris submarine, in addition to instructions on skin diving and safety equipment and how to use it.

OTHER EVENTS include exhibits by the police, fire, civil defense and parks and recreation departments. The American Red Cross will be there with a blood bank and nurses will operate a first aid station. There will be an ambulance in attendance from the Birmingham Ambulance Service. All of these will be in addition to the industrial exhibits.

There will be helicopter rides for both children and adults, a contest for those who want to enter either cakes, pies, bread or cookies and the Oakland County Sheriff's department will demonstrate highway and water safety.

JACKIE GOW, the "Flying Scotsman" of the Chrysler-Killie Fife and Drum Corp., will do a sword dance and a highland fling to the accompaniment of bag pipes and drums.

WXYZ will be broadcasting from a mobile trailer. There will be "kiddie" and teen rides and refreshments.
