Highway Dept. Details Costs Of New Roads

Every once in a while, someone asks the Michigan State Highway Department how much a road costs.

The most expensive roads in Michigan cost about 150 times as much as the least expensive. A two-lane highway out in the country will cost about \$100,000 a mile. A freeway through downtown Detroit will cost up to \$15 million a mile.

But in terms of moving people, the most expensive roads are usually the cheapest.

THE LODGE Freeway in Detroit, for instance, is one of those that cost around \$15 million a mile. Every day it carries about 125,000 vehicles. This means sections of the Lodge Freeway cost \$122 a mile for each car that uses it.
