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Century Cement Wins B'ham Sidewalk Bid

A \$48,247.35 contract has been awarded to the Century Cement Co. for the construction of sidewalks in Birmingham.

The project is composed of replacement in the area west of Woodward and north of Oak; the area bounded by Maple, Henrietta, Brown and the Rouge River; the area north of Maple and east of Oak; the area adjacent of Municipal Parking Lot No. 6 and the area adjacent to Crestview Park.

NEW SIDEWALKS will be constructed on the south side of Oak,

east of Woodward; both sides of Derby and Pembroke west of Eton; west side of Grassfield north of Derby; west side of Torry from south of Lincoln to Bannaville; west side of Southfield, south of Maple; the east end of Crestview Park; west side of St. Andrews.

City Engineer William T. Killean said the contract also provides for the replacing of sidewalks damaged by the city during the installation of sewer and water services.

Century Cement's low bid was

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approximately three per cent under the engineering department's estimate, Killean said.

He said they will start work soon after the contracts are executed and the contractor should be able to complete the work within the specified time.

The Oak, Derby, Pembroke, Grassfield and Torry walks are scheduled to be completed Aug. 24 and the remaining part of the program is to be completed by Sept. 28.

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State Police Set July 4 Patrols

With Michigan roads expected to be jammed on the July 4 week end, the state police will again operate special holiday patrols from noon Wednesday to midnight, July 7, Commissioner Joseph A. Childs said today.

Pointing out that the hourly traffic death rate is higher during holiday periods than at other times of the year, he stressed that the cooperation of every driver and pedestrian is needed if Michigan is to hold down the accident toll.

In the last seven years, 1956-62, holiday traffic deaths averaged one each three hours and 58 minutes compared with one every five hours and 45 minutes during the remainder of the year, he said.

THE HOLIDAY period this year for traffic statistics purposes will be 102 hours, from 6 p.m. Wednesday to midnight July 7. The previous two correspondingly long July 4 week ends claimed 12 lives in 1961, or one death every 8.5 hours, and 20 in 1957, or one every 6.1 hours.

Last year's toll of nine dead in a

30-hour period was an average of one fatality every three hours and 20 minutes.

Patrol emphasis will be from 3 to 9 p.m. each day of the holiday period with principal focus on the state trunklines and the high accident sections. Primary county roads carrying heavy traffic will be patrolled as needed.

THE SERVICES of all personnel, including detectives where available, will be used on desk, patrol or supervisory duty. Patrol days for Thursday, July 4, have been cancelled.

Assisting the State Police will be 106 members of the National Guard who will serve as second men on two-man patrols and on point control. Guardsmen will assist from 2 to 11 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday.
