

### Lathrup Schedules Hearings on Paying, Zoning Amendment

LATHRUP—Two public hearings have been scheduled here during July.

A hearing on the paving of Lathrup Blvd. from Cambridge to San Quentin, originally scheduled for July 1, has been reset for Monday, July 15, because there was not enough time to send out notices to affected property owners.

Another—on the multiple-dwelling zoning ordinance amendment—will be held on Monday, July 29. Both public hearings will begin at 8 p.m. in the AAA Office, 26026 Southfield Road.

### Appropriate \$148,300 for Golf Course

It's official now: Birmingham will soon have a second municipal golf course.

City commissioners Monday night appropriated \$148,300 to cover the cost of the project. They also entered into an agreement with W. Bruce Matthews to supervise the construction of the course.

Construction of the new nine-hole course at the old sewage disposal plant site at Lincoln and Cranbrook roads will begin almost immediately. It is hoped the course will be ready for play in time for the 1964 golf season.

IN ADDITION to the 3,200-yard course, the new recreation project will include a picnic area with tot lot and playground equipment, a portable ski tow and other sporting facilities.

The actual course construction will cost about \$44,000. Another \$50,000 will go for a watering system for tees, greens and fairways; and \$25,000 is earmarked for a golf clubhouse and warming room for winter sports.

Course maintenance equipment is expected to cost \$10,500 and the cost of a 7,000-foot fence around the entire area has been set at \$17,500.

THE CONSTRUCTION of a parking lot and entrance road to the equipment storage building have been estimated at \$6,000 each, while the picnic area and tot lot, including playground equipment, will run \$2,800.

Matthews, a golf course architect from Newaygo, will get \$6,000 from the city for providing detailed plans, specifications, working drawings and to supervise construction of the course. He has received \$5,000 for preliminary work.

The fee for Matthews' services will be paid in six installments of \$1,000 each.

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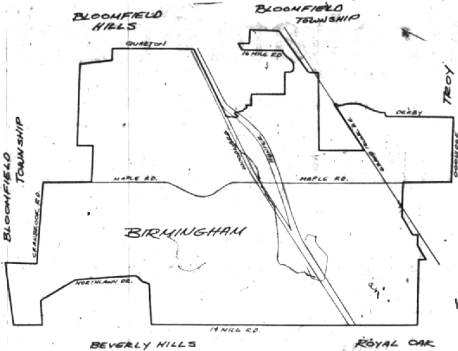


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### B'ham Fire Dept. Boundaries

### Commission Postpones Two Public Hearings

Two public hearings were adjourned by the Birmingham City Commission Monday night.

The establishment of an alley right-of-way in the block bounded by Townsend, Pierce, Brown and Henrietta was postponed until July 8 to allow time for the administration to prepare additional drawings of the route of the alley.

The administration had recommended the construction of an east-west alley, taking 13 feet for the right-of-way from property on the north side of the alley and seven feet from the property on the south side.

FRANK SMITH, who owns property on the south side of the proposed alley, told the commissioners his property would decrease in value and limit the type of building that could be constructed on it if he lost seven feet of frontage on Townsend. He suggested a five-15 foot split.

The Chester Co. which owns property on the south side, suggested the seven-13 split.

The administration was instructed to transfer the matter to a hearing on Monday.

Anthony Guyers, 1926 Cragin, Bloomfield Township, has assumed his post as clerk of committees for Oakland County Board of Supervisors, to which he was recently appointed.

Dr. Smith, who is presently superintendent of schools in Greenwich, Conn., will take over the Birmingham system on Sept. 17.

The board agreed to participate in the activities of the Michigan Association of School Boards.

Manufacturers National Bank, National Bank of Detroit and the Michigan National Bank were all designated as school depositors by the board.

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
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
