

Beverly Hills Loses Road Jurisdiction

BEVERLY HILLS—Councilman Edward Dolan told the council at Monday's regular meeting that as of July 1, Oakland County has withdrawn from Beverly Hills jurisdiction over that length of 13 1/2 mile road which abuts Acacia Park Cemetery.

Dolan explained that this would take some \$500 away from the Village's annual share of the gas and weight tax which is \$71,000.

Several possibilities for regaining the jurisdiction were discussed but no council action was taken.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, Councilman Chester A. Guilmet presented a report on the Metropolitan Federal Savings Association which plans to build a branch at 14 Mile road and Southfield.

A request by Buck Sullivan, 21890 Hampton, to tap in to the water system on Lahar was referred to the Water and Sewer Commission for study.

A proposal by Davey Tree Ex-

ports Company on Dutch Elm discussed trees were referred to the Village Special Services Commission.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION will look over a suggestion that air conditioners be installed in the village offices. The Special Services Commission will decide on a petition signed by 33 villagers, which was being kept up at Groves every day from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m., including Sundays and holidays.

Village Manager Robert E. Murphy reported on bids for two-drawer filing cabinets, which the council found too expensive and suggested that less expensive files be sought.

Councilman Dolan suggested that a discrepancy in grading between Huntley Subdivision and Beverly Hills 12, where they abut, may cause problems. The building inspector was directed to look into the matter.

Heart Attack It Fatal to J. R. Wilson

J. Ryley Wilson, finance manager of Chevrolet Motor Division, was stricken with a fatal heart attack June 26 shortly after he had addressed 2,000 persons at Cobo Hall. He was 61.

Wilson, who resided with his wife at 275 Marblehead, Bloomfield Hills, failed to respond to oxygen administered to him by a Detroit Fire Department Rescue Squad and was pronounced dead on arrival at Receiving Hospital.

A few minutes prior to his collapse he had addressed an executive forum conducted in the Cobo Hall ballroom as part of an International Data Processing Conference.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday at the E. C. & G. R. Harris Funeral Home, Detroit. Contributions in lieu of flowers may be made to the Mayflower Memorial Fund, 7301 Curtis, Detroit.

AS FINANCE MANAGER of Chevrolet, Wilson held one of the top executive positions in the division. Under his supervision was the broad administrative program which included operations analysis, general auditing, comptroller operations and the coordination of

methods and systems. Among these special duties were product planning and scheduling, statistical analysis and specialized studies, pricing, budget controls and related fields.

A native of Bethlehem, Pa., Wilson joined Chevrolet in 1933 as an auditor at the division's car and truck assembly plant at North Tarrytown, N. Y. He previously had spent 13 years in financial and accounting departments of other companies, including five years in the construction field abroad involving the rehabilitation of European cities following World War I.

IN CIVIC LIFE Wilson was vice president and an unpaid member of Detroit's Street and Traffic Commission until he moved his residence to Bloomfield Hills two months ago, and was a member of the Economic Club of Detroit, the Detroit Golf Club, the Recreas, and the Detroit Athletic Club. Two weeks ago he was elected president of Southeastern Michigan Junior Achievement.

At the time of his death Wilson was a member of the Pulpit Committee, and Board of Deacons and editor of the Church News of Mayflower Congregational Church, Detroit. He was a past Church Moderator and a member of the board of trustees of that church.

Survivors include his wife, the former Florence F. Fisher; a son, James R. Wilson of Flint; a daughter, Mrs. John Wardrop of Evanston, Ill., and two grandchildren.
