## Parishes Join In Service at Christ Church

A special service, written by Henry S. Booth, chairman of The Cranbrook Foundation, was held July 4 in Christ Church Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, in an attempt to put meaning into Independence Day.

Three hundred persons from various Episcopal parishes in the metropolitan Detroit area, including Ann Arbor and Grosse Ile, attended the Service of Witness in Affirmation of Our Interdependence.

The program was sponsored by the Michigan Chapter of The Episcopal Society for Cultural and Racial Unity.

A HIGHLIGHT of the event was the Hand of Fellowship. In this portion of the service each member of the congregation shook the hand of those to right and left, before and behind, as a symbol of their common interdependence and membership in the Family of God.

Some 40 per cent of those attending were Negro.

Officiating clergymen for the service were the Rt. Rev. Archie H. Crowley, suffragan bishop of Michigan; the Rev. John H. Albrecht, assistant minister of Christ Church Cranbrook; the Rev. Henri A. Stines, rector of Grace Church, Detroit; the Rev. W. James Walker, assistant rector of Grace Church; and the Rev. Paul S. Hiyama, rector of St. Andrews Church, Clawson.

ALSO PARTICIPATING were the Rev. Samuel F. Williams, vicar of St. Clements Church, Inkster, and the Rev. Dumont Morisseau, vicar of St. Augustin Church, Detroit.

A picnic in the church park followed the service.

Funds for the Birmingham YMCA's expansion program have grown to \$219,375.

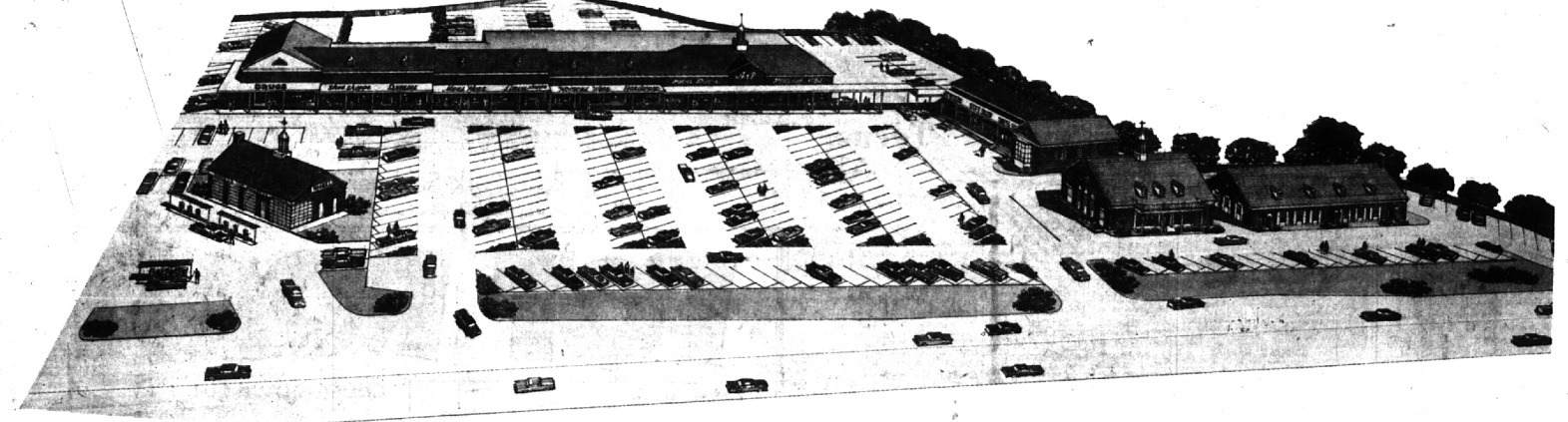
Executive Director Bill Beck reported today that \$175,099 has been donated in the Advance Gifts Division.
