

Clock Cote Erected At Local Church

Motorists who reportedly missed seeing the clocks at the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, Birmingham, can again glance up and see one of them perched atop the roof of the Youth Building. A steple on the main roof of the church originally housed three clocks. When the steple was removed three years ago the clocks were not replaced. By popular demand, one of the clocks was replaced in a clock cote July 2 on top of the Youth Building, which has an entrance identical to the main building, only on a smaller scale. The clock cote was assembled on the ground (left) and raised by crane to the top of the building (above). The cote was then secured on the roof (right). Rev. Gass Lectures To Diocesan Group

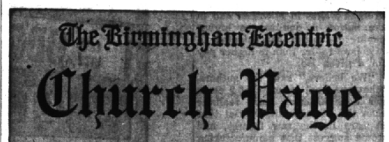

Throughout the summer months Kirk in the Hills will continue with two regular services each Sunday at 9:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.

The full chancel choir will sing at both services, and two sessions of the Kirk school will be held concurrently with the worship services.

FIRST of the guest preachers, the Rev. Dr. Ernest Gordon, dean, Princeton University Chapel, will give the sermon on July 21. Dr. Gordon, in addition to being widely recognized for his ministerial career, is also the author of several books.

On July 28, the Rev. Dr. Samuel H. Miller, dean, Harvard Divinity School, will be in the Kirk pulpit. Dr. Miller is a national leader in the parish ministry and in the field of pastoral theology.
