Idea for the party stemmed from the singular origin of the club, for its site was originally chosen as the objective of the weekend automobile "runs" by Col. John Jacob Astor's Automobile Club of Michigan.

Gas Buggy Adventure

In those days, when the north boundary of Detroit was not too many blocks beyond Vernor Highway, driving a car to the wilds of Pine Lake was a major adventure — so the seenic bulf overlooking the lake became an overnight camp site for hardy Detroiters who owned cars.

In 1905 the first clubhouse was bult and its list of charter members included such "greats" as Henry Ford, James Couzens, John Dodge, Robert C. Hupp, E. Leroy Pelletter and Horace Rackham. Truman H. Newberry was the first president.

By 1917, with improved roads and driving skills, members had more time to enjoy themselves after a shorter drive, so seven golf holes were added. The next few years brought more additions and in 1921 the club was officially named Pine Lake Country Club.
