10. Weeds in the garden will be no problem and give you plenty of time for bridge & boating, picnics and procrastination, tennis and teas, dangerous living, and dancing if you will just:
 - a) weed your gardens thoroughly
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 - e) Spray with SESONE.

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11. ISOTOX, MALATHION, SEVIN, BORDEAUX, FRUIT TREE SPRAY, and others properly applied at the proper time will free you AND your flowers and vegetables from the ravages of the insect world. 12. Indoor or out—CHLORDANE is the anathema to the insect world. LIQUID OR POWDER
13. SPHER MITES—warm dry weather brings danger to evergreens with this (-) dot sized pest. Needles toward center of plant yellow and speckle, turn brown and drop off. Hose them in hot water as the mites hate water like a boy hates a bath. Then spray with ISOTOX or KELTHANE.
14. DO NOT STOP SPRAYING APPLES.
15. PEACHES. If you have a heavy set thin them to 8" apart. Keep tall grass away from the trunk and carefully spray crotches until late August. DDT is BEST for peach, plum, and sweet cherry. There is nothing soft about gardening as we observe, the person who does the right thing at the right time spends a helluva lot less money and time than does the spasmodic person who awakens he is going to move into an apartment next year. God save him.

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P.S. A few last minute bulletins from your County Agricultural Agent Re:—

Apples—DO NOT STOP SPRAYING APPLES as the maggot is getting busy. Mow the grass around the trees, or it will rob the trees of the moisture it so desperately needs.

Peaches—If you have a heavy set of fruit thin them to 8" apart. Keep tall grass away from the trunks and spray the crotches with DDDIE (or DDT) every 3 weeks

BORERS are a problem. (Malathion and Sevin are not so effective on borers).

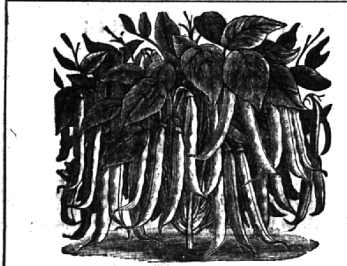
Squash—Spray weekly with METHOXYCHLOR (Marlate) for vine borer and squash bugs.

PINES—Pine shoot moth injury can be eliminated by pruning on Scotch and Red pines. Call the County Agricultural Agent at FE 4-2564 and ask for pamphlet on "Pruning Pines!"
