

# Book Is Guide to Europe—on Foot

TURN RIGHT AT THE FOUNTAIN, by George W. Oakes; Holt, Rinehart and Winston, 1953; New York, N. Y.; 236 pp.; \$3.95.

If the 50-mile hike fanfare failed to get a rise out of you, you may find the incentive to abandon your easy chair and polish up those walking shoes in "Turn Right At The Fountain."

The author is a man who not only makes walking sound like fun, but he makes it his business to see that you get more than exercise out of it.

If you follow his clarion call, you will not only see all the interesting countries of Europe but you will also see places that are never included in the "guided" tour.

FOR ALTHOUGH Oakes' title sounds like the tag-line of a murder mystery, the book is a guide for a walking tour of London, Oxford, Cambridge, Edinburgh, Copenhagen, Amsterdam, Bruges, Paris, Rome, Florence, Venice, Vienna, Munich and Geneva.

And it is no neophyte collection. You might say it was put together by popular demand of those readers who have followed his practical, inclusive and clear accounts of the countries he visited and the sights he saw in the New York Times.

THE BOOK is complete. Each chapter is designed to present a leisurely walk that you can take in a morning or afternoon. It enables you to cover the outstanding features as well as the hidden fascinations of the city you are traversing.

With each walk is an outline map, explicit directions, a description of what you will see and brief historical notes about the features along the route.

IN PRESENTING these walks he tells you where to find unusual eating places, quaint antique and bookshops, clothing and millinery stores and art galleries in each city.

He gives up-to-date information on the times that specific collections are on view, the hours a particular garden will be open, how to apply for permission to attend special events, where to stop for rest and refreshments.

And he is never dull about it!

SINCE ROME is so much in the news, some of his comments on that city might be interesting and pertinent.

He warns that no visitor can do justice to Rome in a few days, for no other city in the Western world contains so much of historical interest or presents such an extensive view of Western culture.

He begins your acquaintance with the Eternal City with three walks; one that introduces ancient Rome; the other two—both in the same general vicinity—take you to places that are not seen ordinarily by tourists.

THE FIRST STROLL takes you to the Capitol and the Capitoline Museum which contains one of the world's oldest collections of Greek and Roman statuary; the Forum, the center of political and religious life in Roman days; the Colosseum, which symbolizes the eternity of Roman civilization for it

has survived earthquakes, fire and vandalism.

THE NEXT two walks take you to some of the most fascinating churches in Rome—ones that many tourists miss. One includes the only church in Rome (San Clemente) where you can see three centuries of religious worship—dating from the second century to the twelfth—superimposed on one another at different levels of the same location.

The next stroll will bring you to Aventine Hill and the Basilica of St. John Lateran where Popes have been crowned since 1870.

One cannot criticize Jack's dou-

ble of five clubs; many did just that, but Grace knew her partner could trust her for some defensive tricks. She had none, so her five heart bid showed excellent judgment.

In the play of the hand, West led with a club. East did not care to give Grace a sluff and a ruff, so he returned a diamond. With this defense, Grace was able to go down just one trick.

With perfect defense, she could only go down two tricks, but at those tables where East got the contract for five clubs, they found it easy to make six. Only a diamond opening, overtaking the ace and a return of a diamond could defeat six.

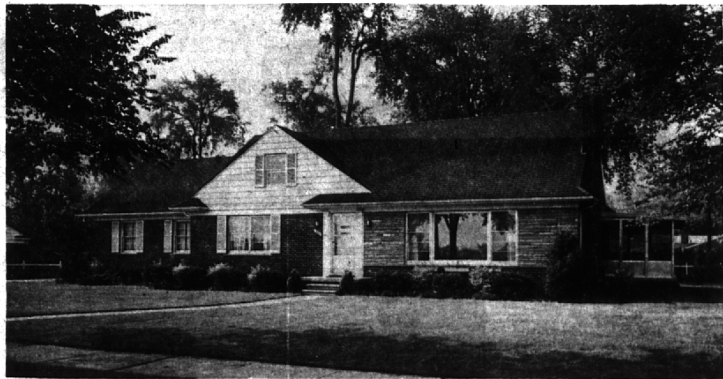

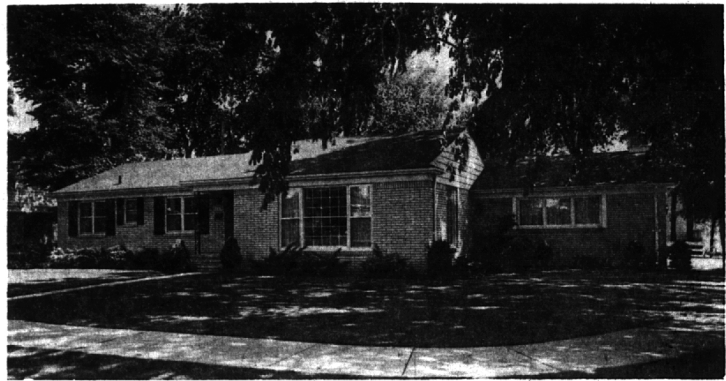

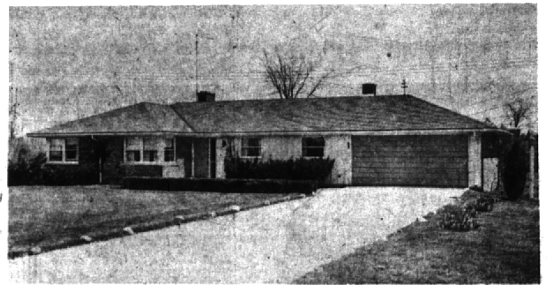
