OTHER BOARD ACTION included hiring Larry King of the Miller, Canfield Faddock and Stone law firm to serve on a retainer basis. King will be in attendance at all school board meetings. The arrangement is for a year.

A review of the school district's elementary French program was made by Mrs. Mary Harvey, French instructor. Mrs. Harvey told the board the program had been hampered by a lack of qualified language teachers. Rather than stretching the available teachers' instruction over all elementary grades, French will only be given to fifth and sixth grade pupils next year.

be appointed again. The term is for three years.

Charles H. Walter, Jr., 16940 Dunblaine, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Edward F. Dolan, Jr., on the planning board. Dolan is now a member of the council.

THE REQUEST of Howard Keating for approval of a plat for Rondale subdivision, at Beverly Road and Evergreen, was sent to the planning board for study and recommendations. The sub will have 35 lots.

A committee consisting of Councilmen Hugh G. Allerton, Jr., chairman, Claude A. Shepard, Edward F. Dolan and John Magee, will meet with Village Attorney Thomas J. Dillon to discuss a change in the method of compensation of Johnson and Anderson, the village engineers.

The change would be from a percentage on inspection fees to a straight charge of number of days at \$60 per day, with bids on each job to be submitted by the inspectors.

Councilman Edward M. Shurtliff suggested that perhaps the village should look over its inspection costs for the last few years and decide if they wanted to set up their own agencies.

VILLAGE MANAGER Robert E. Murphy was contacted by the council to inform Bertha A. Sullivan, 21850 Hampton, and R. D. Benscoter, 30905 Lahser, that they could tap in to the water service at a cost of \$728 for the Sullivan property and \$1,448 for the Benscoter property. Both costs will carry the additional tap in charge in accordance with the village ordinance.

Both residents had requested water service. Another request, by John Wall, 20793 Kennoway Drive, for water brought a request from the council that Murphy inform Wall that water service for his property can be provided only by installation at his cost of six-inch asbestos water mains extending from the existing main at 14 Mile Road to the north boundary of his property.

A RESOLUTION for an increase in the sewage disposal charge was not adopted. The resolution called for an increase of \$1.50 a quarter for sewer maintenance. The method of payment was put off until bids on the emergency part of the work are received.

Approval was given for payment of \$18,858.20 to Coolidge Electric Co. for work on water mains, and \$569.18 to Johnson and Anderson for engineering costs.
