



Troy Parish Begins Church Construction

The new St. Thomas More Parish in Troy has unusual building plans. The new church building has been planned as a school.

While planned and built for classroom occupancy, it will serve as a church until the need for a school is apparent, according to church officials.

Once the school is operative, a new and permanent church will be built.

The St. Thomas More parish influence area is only sparsely developed at the moment. Rapid growth is expected.

St. Hugo and Holy Name Schools are handling education for the 300 St. Thomas More families for the time being.

ST. THOMAS More is located on Adams Road, north of Wattles in Troy Township. The parish is composed of families living east of Squirrel Road who were detached from Holy Name, Birmingham, and St. Hugo, Bloomfield Hills, parishes.

The new church (school) construction has started and is expected to be completed by Dec. 15. Meanwhile, Sunday Mass is being said in Harlan School.

Kirk Slates Harvard Dean

The Rev. Dr. Samuel H. Miller, dean of the Harvard Divinity School, author and minister, will be in the pulpit of Kirk in the Hills Sunday.

His subject at both the 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. services will be "The Burnt-out Case."

A native of Philadelphia, Dr. Miller is a graduate of Colgate University and was minister to Baptist churches in Belmar, Arlington and Clifton, N. J., before becoming minister to the Old Cambridge Baptist Church.

IN ADDITION to his Cambridge ministry, he was adjunct professor of the philosophy of religion at Andover - Newton Theological School from 1935 to 1957 and lecturer on pastoral theology at Harvard from 1958 to 1969, when he was named dean of the Harvard Divinity School.

Dr. Miller is a member of the Commission on the Arts and Worship of the National Council of Churches and is on the editorial board of the Journal of Pastoral Care.

Rev. Lusk is interested in liturgy, including forms of sacramental worship and Sunday and daily service.
