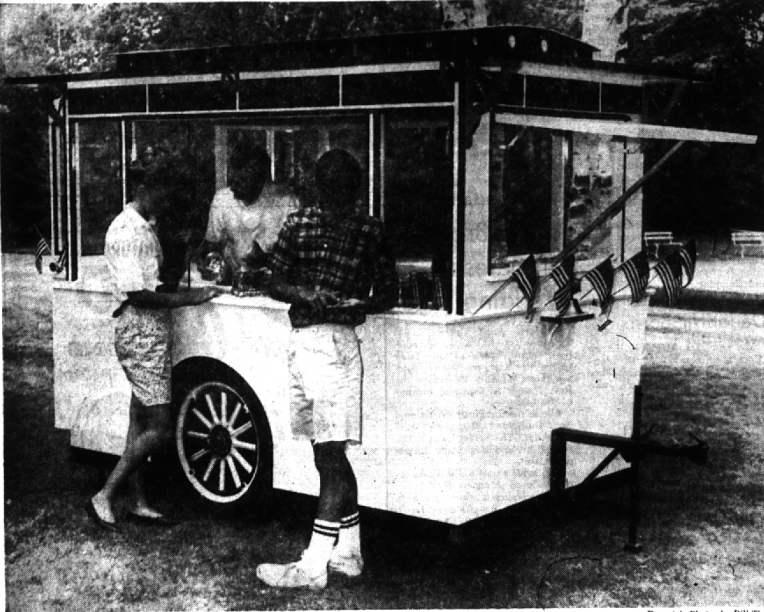
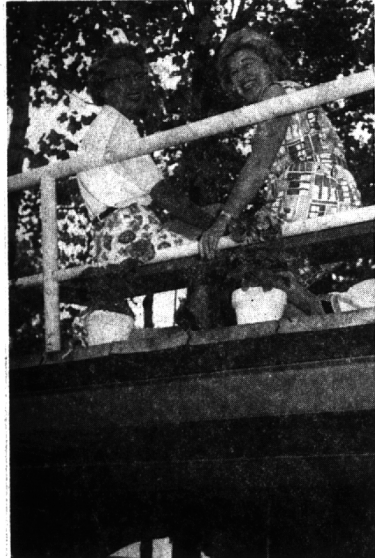


Birmingham Goes to Nipigon
