GOLFERS DUEL TUESDAY

Orchard Lake Ready For Palmer, Player

Arnold Palmer and Gary Player have begun three weeks of exhibition golf matches which will bring them to the Birmingham area Tuesday.

At 2 p.m. that day, they will compete on the links at Orchard Lake Country Club in a benefit match for Camp Oakland.

Palmer will land his brown and white Aero Commander early that morning at Pontiac Municipal Airport.

PLAYER IS EXPECTED to arrive via commercial airlines from New York City the night before. On Monday he will be playing an exhibition match with Perry Como, Jackie Robinson and other celebrities in Westchester County, N. Y., to benefit the City of Hope.

Only four of the matches in the three-week round of exhibition golf will be Palmer-Player duels. Nearly all will benefit charitable organizations. The 18-hole match here is sponsored by the Women's Com-

mittee for Camp Oakland to raise funds for a new boys' ranch at the Oxford, Mich. camp.

Area Drivers Pace Action At Waterford

Sports car drivers from the Birmingham area maintained their lead in Sunday's big sports car program at Waterford Hills. The 4,000 fans who stayed through the mid-afternoon showers witnessed one of the finest programs held thus far at Waterford.

Jerry Thompson of Troy turned in an outstanding showing in the production feature race, as he drove his Lotus Super 7 to a first place win. Joe Mulholland of Bloomfield Hills, driving a Jaguar XKE, came in second behind Thompson.

BILL BARBER of Birmingham took first place in the E production section with a Porsche. In the modified feature race Eric Pohl of Southfield was first in the H modified division, driving a Lotus 17.

In the E & F production race, Bill Barber of Birmingham took second place with a Porsche, followed in third by Larry Sherman of Huntington Woods, also driving a Porsche.

Bob Gubbins of Birmingham won the Class C production race with his AC Bristol. Mulholland took a third in the Class U sedan race driving an MG 1100.

In RACE 7, Class A & B production, Tom Swindell of Pontiac drove off first with his Corvette; Mulholland in the Jaguar XKE was second and Bill Schumacher of Birmingham, with a Corvette, placed third. Class B was won by Thompson with the Lotus Super 7.

Divisional Race has been held at the Oakland County course. Waterford Hills Course is located just six miles North of Pontiac and a quarter mile East of U.S. No. 10.

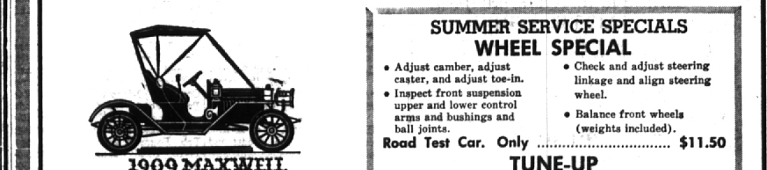
