

Girl Scouts Fete Sudanese Friends

Members of the Southern Oakland Girl Scout Council senior planning board honored the council's Sudanese Girl Ranger guests with an old-fashioned American picnic recently at the home of Mrs. Joseph Rodgers of Royal Oak.

Zenab Nassan El Yamani and Tayeba El Mahdi flew from their home in Khartoum, Sudan, to spend a month camping with American Girl Scouts, studying service opportunities for women and experience living in the homes of typical American Senior Scouts.

Eighteen-year-old Zenab is working toward her Cambridge Certificate and has been a Ranger Scout for two years.

TAYEBA attended El Mahdi Secondary School. She is nineteen and has spent five years at a Girl Guide, two as a Ranger and was chosen to attend a national guide encampment in the Sudan in 1961.

Both girls speak, read and write Arabic and English. As Moslems, they spent their childhood in the custom which keeps Moslem women in strict seclusion.

Representative of a new generation of young women, Zenab and Tayeba plan to learn new ways of service during their visit, which they can apply to the life of their own community.

SINCE MAY they have practiced with Girl Guide leaders so that they would be familiar with Western silverware, cooking cus-

tons, even the American mode of dishwashing.

As a final concession to the ways of western women, both girls were given a gift certificate and grandfather to purchase bathing suits and caps, but they may only swim where no men or boys are present.

Visits to Christian churches have been planned, but during their stay each will follow the Moslem ritual of prayer five times a day, silently and alone.

THE GIRLS have been guests of Indianapolis Scout Day Campers, with whom they shared scrapbooks and pictures of their homeland.

They have also toured Baptist Citizens' Home, Cranbrook, Sarah Fisher-St. Vincent Home, Northland and the Shrine of the Little Flower.

They joined the centennial celebration of Henry Ford's birth at Ford Motor Company and Greenfield Village as guests of the Southern Oakland International Association.

THE GIRLS were welcomed at the senior planning board picnic by past president Marcia Duval of Fremont. Other Birmingham hostesses included Kathy Hercherberg, Sandi Spencer, Kirkland Hill and Helen Gurley.
