The American Association of University Women, Educational Foundation, announces that application forms are now available for fellowships for American women for the year 1964-65.

Applications may be filed by American women who hold the doctorate, or who will have fulfilled all requirements for the doctorate except the dissertation, by the time the fellowship year begins, or who are established in professional careers and recognized for scholarly competence. There are no restrictions as to age or place of research.

THE AWARDS presented will be one award of \$5,000, five awards of \$4,000, ten awards of \$3,500, and thirty awards of \$3,000.

DECEMBER 1, 1963, is the deadline for filing and applicants will be notified of awards by March 1, 1964. July 1, 1964 is the beginning of the fellowship year.
